The culture of small fruits should be  
more generally practiced by our farm-  
ers, the country over, than it now is.  
Out of a love for the possession of such  
wholesome fruits, from the health,  
enjoyment brings and the profit  
which may be realized therefrom, we  
hope that as broad plans as circum-  
stances will permit, will be carried out  
in practice this spring. It does not  
require much room for a strawberry  
bed large enough to supply delicious  
food from early to late. Have a few  
bushes of the best raspberries of the  
black-cap varieties, and some of the  
approved black berries, trained and  
pruned and kept in proper shape.  
Current bushes set here and there,  
and neatly trimmed to single stems,  
will not take up much room, but will  
furnish much good fruit. But no fruit  
garden is complete without the grape.  
Trim up a few vines, where room is  
scarce, on strong posts or on the rear  
of some building. Ten or a dozen  
vines may be cultivated on a thirty  
foot lot.
