### NOVEMBER ELECTIONS

The elections of Nov. 16, have been sweeping republican victories, a remarkable and inspiring change and rally from the past year's election. It was a good deal to be expected when Ohio had gone democratic last year, that old B. F. Butler could be elected to Massachusetts, but it has been done and will done, he is in aid in the credit of every many democrat who have refused to support him. It was too much to hope that New York could change from its vote of 192,000 democratic majority for Cleveland for governor last year, to a republican majority this year, but it has done so. New York city, the strong hold of democracy, barely escaped going republican. Pennsylvania has returned to its first love and to the Republican column, taking its place for 1884, and Ohio and Wisconsin are also republican. Minnesota remains true to their colors. Virginia has been retained through the rain route of the last few days by the democrats, and Maryland and New Jersey also. In every respect it was a day of glorious republican victories, and the importance of it can hardly be estimated. It makes 19 electoral votes, those of New York, Massachusetts and Connecticut, which were doubtful and confidently claimed by democrats before the November elections, they may be obtained for a republican president in 1884. Add to these the electoral votes of Pennsylvania, Minnesota, Nebraska and Iowa, a splendid start for a republican president is easily made. To president Arthur the republican victories in New York means very much. It is a home and it has retained itself from 192,000 democratic majority last year to republican majority this year. It looks a good deal like General Arthur is to be the nominee next year. The worst drift that has enveloped Ben Butler is certainly a great republican victory over which this country will greatly rejoice and over which the old state of Massachusetts can once more hold up her head.

Gen. Joseph Blair who had been elected secretary of state in New York upon the Republican ticket in 1882, was a gallant soldier and is an ironical and a Catholic. The ranks of Republicanism are everywhere being recruited with earnest, zealous workers from the Irish people who are disgusted with the free trade proclivities of the democratic party.
