

REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION. The Republican electors of the State of Nebraska are invited to send delegates from the several counties to meet in convention at Lincoln, Thursday, May 1, at 7:30 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of selecting four (4) delegates at large to the national republican convention called to meet at Chicago, June 30, 1884 for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for president and vice-president of the United States.

The several counties are entitled to representation as follows, being based on the vote cast for J. M. Hlatt, regent of the university, giving one delegate at large and one for every one hundred and fifty votes and the major fraction thereof.

Table listing delegates from various counties: Adams, Antelope, Boone, Brown, Buffalo, Butler, Burt, Cass, Cedar, Cheyenne, Cherry, Clay, Colfax, Cuming, Custer, Dakota, Dawson, Dixon, Dodge, Douglas, Fillmore, Franklin, Frontier, Furnas, Gage, Gosper, Greeley, Hamilton, Harlan, Hitchcock, Holt, Howard, Jefferson, Johnson.

It is recommended by the committee that separate conventions be held within each congressional district for the purpose of electing the two district delegates. In case of the failure of the electors of any district to elect the delegates to which they are entitled, and in conformity to the call of the national committee, the delegates elected to the state convention from such district will be authorized to meet in separate convention and elect said delegates. It is recommended that in such counties as have changed their political subdivisions by the organization of new precincts, or the adoption of township organization since the last election, the appointment of delegates to the county convention be made in accordance with the old precinct boundaries.

It is recommended that no proxies be admitted to the convention, except such as are held by persons residing in the counties from which proxies are given.

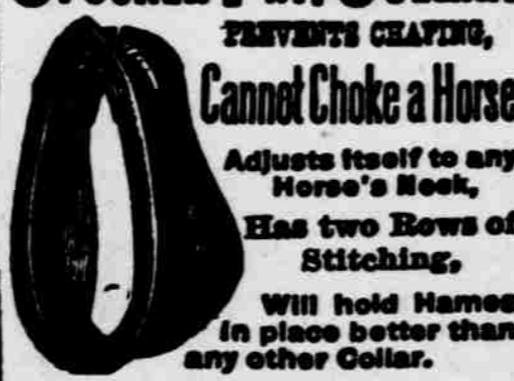
