ach his relatives. His name is Walter Marris. He came to this ricinity, about two months since, said he was looking for a horse ranch, stopped at my ranch most of the time he was in this country. He bought 50 head and started north. He met with an accident on the 16th of last month which I will give just as it was stated to me by a young man working for Mr Harris. He took a long drive on the 18th to reach Palidoso crock near the line of Texas and Indian territory. I was on guard and heard shooting in the camp. I thought at the time that a bear had come in camp and the boys were shooting at it, but when I rode around the he ses no r camp I saw October 1, 1885. about 25 men on horse back. At the same time I saw Mr Harris and one of his men coming through the line outside. Mr Harris had a six shooter in each hand and was shooting at them Holdrege will discuss the question, revery fast. The men, or Indians, were keeping up a deadly fire on the camp, Just then I saw Mr Harris and his man (Billy Wade) get through the line of Indians, I saw Billy drop from his horse. Walter stopped and got off his horse and shot several times. I guess he saw Billy was dead for he got on his horse immediately and rode off in a gallop shooting back at every jump. He come up to me and said "turn the horses loose, Charley, and save yourself. I will try and get the red devils to follow me," and that was the last time he was seen or heard of. I heard him shooting for some time after he left me. I haid out till daylight and then went in camp and found two men killed, (Jim Snow and Ben Hale,) I rode out to where Billy fell and found him I rode out to where Billy fell and found him dead. That was all of the hoys but the cook, and he was gone. I found him five infies down the creek. He said when the shooting connemenced he isy flat on the ground till they followed Walter off; then he ran of. We hunted for Walter and found him horse killed, but could not find him. We brought his horses tack here I have his horses here at my ranch. I do not know where Mr Harris came from or where his lokes live. The young man that eams back also stated that he found four Indians killed in camp the next morning after Walter's fight, also three dead and two crippled ones on the prairie while he was hunting for Walter.

Mr. Harris is a young man about 26 years of age, had dark hair, dark eyes, rather tall and quite in-elligent looking. Any information concerning him will be thankfully received.

CITY ORDINANCE. An ordinance to provide that all male inhabitants of the city of Red Cloud, between the ages of twenty-one and fifty years shall perform two days labor up on the streets, alleys and highways of said city, or pay a labor tax in lied thereof, to prescribe manner of collecting same, and prescribe penalty*

for non-payment. Be it Ordained, By the mayor and council of the city of Red Cloud: Sec. 1. That every male inhabitant

of the city of Red Cloud, between the ages of twenty-one and fifty years (not exempted by law) shall between the let day of April and the first day of November of each year, either by themselves or satisfactory substitutes perform two days labor upon the streets, alleys, and highways of said city, at such times and places as the overseer of streets may direct, upon three days notice in writing being giv-

Sec. 2. That all persons notified all provided by Sec. 1st of this ordinance may commute the labor so required by the payment of three dollars to the strent commissioner or city treasurer. The overseer of streets shall deliver to persons working out or commuting said labor tax as herein provided, a certificate showing the fact. The fund so arising shall be expended by the city authorities in the repair and maintenance of the streets, affeys and highwave of said city.
