CURRENT COMMENT.

The water on the line of the Vicksburg, Shreveport & Texas railroad has so far receded as to enable the management of that road to assert that they will be able to run trains through again.

The Council of the Cyclopedia Horse Society of Great Britain and Ireland will present valuable medals for competition at the show of the American Cyclopedia Association in Chicago next September.

Atmos, Topeka & Santa Fe earnings for April are understood to have held up pretty well with last year. The May returns thus far show a fair gain over 1885. Sonora earnings thus far in 1886 have run about the same as last year.

A meeting of the Indian Silver Association was held at Santa Fe, N. M., at which the Governor generally was present. Sir Auckland Colvin, financial member of the Council, in an address to the meeting declared that the future of India depended upon English adoption of bimetalism.

Advices from Pekin say that the Chinese Government has become alarmed at the size of the projected English loan to Tibet, and will ask that the loan be reduced, and that the mission shall represent simply a commercial body. Otherwise the Tibetans will refuse to allow the party to enter their territory.

It was stated that information was given to the Chicago Grand Jury in the investigation of the Haymarket riots, showing that the anarchists had discussed plans for setting fire to the city in the northwest portion and other districts. An anarchist section existed well trained in the use of explosives. Dynamite had been discovered in various places of concealment.

More about Bill Pigeon comes in the following from Fort Smith, Ark.: Information has just been received here of the killing of a cowboy from Grayson County, Tex., by Bill Pigeon, the Indian Territory desperado, who murdered Deputy Irwin a short time ago. The cowboy was armed and rode up to Pigeon's house. The latter, thinking him a deputy marshal, shot and killed him.

The Panama canal question was discussed at length in a French Cabinet Council recently. The Cabinet finally decided to authorize the Panama Company to issue a loan of 100,000,000 francs in shares, provided the company is able to prove that this sum is sufficient to complete the canal. The company, on the other hand, has decided to justly the execution of all work not absolutely indispensable to the opening of the canal to traffic, and thereby fulfill the conditions required by the Government and obtain the authorization to borrow the 100,000,000 francs, without which it would be compelled to stop all further work.

An Indian Territory special says: The Delaware, Pawnee and other adopter citizens of the Cherokee Nation are moving to secure the intervention of the United States Government in presenting the distribution of three hundred thousand dollars lease money per capita among the Cherokees by blood only. A census of Cherokee full bloods is now being taken preparatory to the distribution. The protests have created intense bitterness. A fight is being waged against Chief Bushhead and his administration, and the adopted citizens expect to secure control of the Cherokee Government in 1887, when the election for chief and chiefs occur.

Considerable excitement was caused at Montreal recently by a report that an attempt had been made to abduct Billy Moloney, the late reading clerk of the New York "Herald." Alderson, to run him across the border into the United States. It is well known that for months not only Moloney, but Alderman Dempsey and DeHay as well, who are sharing his exile in Montreal, have been living in constant fear of the fate which it is said Moloney narrowly escaped. They dare not walk out at all at night for fear of being seized from behind, bound, gagged and whirled away toward Sing Sing. Canadian detectives do all they can to excite the fears of the fugitives, and are said to be rapidly bleeding the frightened men out of all their earnings in the aldermanic business.
