Romance and Realism.

It is droll to find Balzac, who sub-re-

such bitter scorn and hate for his realfein while he was alive, now become a fetich in his turn, to be shaken in the faces of those who will not blindly ship him. But it is no new thing in the history of literature: whatever is each lished is sacred with those who do think. At the beginning of the century, when remance was making the fight against effete classicism which realism is making to-day against comance, the Italian poet Monti declared that "the romantic was the cold grown of the beautiful," just as the realism to now supposed to be. The romance that day and the realism of this are in a certain degree the same. Romance then sought, as realism seeks now, to widen the bounds of sympathy, to level every barrier against asthetic freedom, to escape from the paralysis of tradition, It exhausted itself in this impulse; and it remained for realism to assert that fidelity to experience and probability of motive are essential conditions of a great imaginative literature. It is not a new theory, but it has never fore universally characterized literary endeavor. When realism becomes false to itself, when it heaps up facts merely, and maps life instead of picturing it. realism will perish too. Every true realist instinctively knows this, and it is perhaps the reason why he is careful of every fact, and icels himself bound to express or to indicate its meaning at the risk of over-moralizing. In life he finds nothing insignificant; all tells for destiny and character; nothing that God has made is confemptible. He cannot look upon human life and declare that this thing or that thing is unworthy of notice, any more than the scientist can declare a fact of the material world beneath the dignity of his inquiry. He feels in every nerve the equality of things and the unity of men; his soul to exalted, not by vain shows and shadows and ideals, but by realities, in which alone the truth lives. In criticism A is his business to break the images of false gods and misshapen heroes, to take away the poor silly toys that many grown people would still like to play with. He cannot keep terms with Jack the Giant-Killer or Puss in Boots, under any name or in any place, even when they reappear as the convict Vantree, or the Marquis de Montrivant, or the Sworn Thirteen Noblemen. He must say to himself that Balzac, when he imagined these monsters, was not Balzac, he was Dumas; he was not realistic, he was romantie. - W. D. Howells, in Herper's Magazine for May.
