Republican Convention at Blue Hill.

The republican convention for the
first district composed of Adams and
Webster county, was held Monday at
Blue Hill. The convention was call-
ed to order by F. D. Taggart, chair-
man of the first central committee.

Gen. J. Warren, of Red Cloud, was
made temporary chairman, and A. E.
Allyn, of Hastings, temporary secre-
tary. It was moved and carried that
the credentials be handed to the
chairman and that if no contest ap-
pear the list should be declared to the
regularly accredited delegates to the
convention.

After accepting the above lists and
declaring the temporary organization
permanent, the convention proceeded
to ballot for a candidate for first re-
presentative.

M. A. Hartigan placed in nomination
the name of L. Hahn, of Hastings,
and his nomination was made
unanimous on unanimous ballot.

The first central committee was
then formed by electing D. P. New-
singer, of Webster, chairman, and T.
C. Fleming, of Adams, and A. C.
Hansen, of Webster, members, after
which the convention adjourned.

rejected.

ing to be determined by a commis-
sion of three to be named by the
chairman of the board.

manner.

Petition for the closing of a road
in Isaacs township between sections
5 and 6 and signed by F. M. DeLong
and others, tabled.

Proposition of E. H. Doyle conser-
ting to the opening of a road through
section 21-4-12 accepted and road to
be opened on condition that right of
way be granted and no damage
claimed.

Petition for a road signed by J. B.
Wile and others asking for the
opening of a road between sections 11
and 12, town 1, range 11, and run-
ning thence southward to the iron
bridge south of Red Cloud, granted
and road ordered opened.

Report of J. H. Bailey, county
clerk, and E. J. King, county super-
intendent, of receipts and disburse-
ments for the quarter ending Sept.
30th, 1888, accepted and approved.
Board adjourned to meet Oct. 1st.
