DESTROYED HIS DIARY. A Characteristic Incident in the Life of

A characteristic incident in the life of Captain John Ericsson was one which has not appeared in any of the newspaper sketches of the great in-

For nearly fifty years Captain Ericsson had kept a diary, or a series of diaries, in which he every evering covered a full page with the history of the day-the work he had accomplished, that which he proposed doing on the following day, suggestions made by and to him, and his opinions concerning the character of work done and in progress. Added to these entries were frequently opinious of other men's ideas and their work which had been brought to his notice, and in the many years these volumes increased to a very large number.

In the whole period of time mentioned there were only twenty daysin 1856-when this daily custom was departed from, and then only because disabled by machinery and was unable to write. No one ever was permitted to read his daily history, and the volumes were always kept in the Captain's own room.

About two and a half years ago. when Froude published his "Life of Thomas Carlyle" and his "Reminisdisgusted by the publication of letters and other documents by Carlyle, and Mrs. Carlyle, which he thought never should have been put into print, and the night after he had finished these works he called his private secretary, Mr. Taylor, into his room and commanded him to take the volumes of his diary away and destroy them. There were many things in the diary, he said, that he should wish never to see the light of day, and the surest way to prevent such a thing was to destroy every volume. Mr. Taylor put the leaves of the big book under a cutting machine and cut them into millions of pieces. The only thing now left of this valuable record consists of the pasteboard covers of the volumes, which Mr. Taylor has preserved .- N.
