Jefferson Davis, the embodiment of the "lost cause," was buried in New Orleans, last Wednesday under the Jackson monument. How the spirit of Old Hickory must have writhed at this desecration of his monument, for it is on record that Jackson once upon a time was in favor of hanging a South Carolina conspirator who was plotting against the government of his country. But in these later days treason is considered a virtue, and the defenders of the nation are denounced as "coffee coolers," "mendicants," and such names as the most bitter malignancy can inspire.

The Great Cronin Trial.

The greatest trial that has been known, for many years to the American people, was the Cronin trial just ended in Chicago, after over three months deliberation. On last Friday the case was given to the jury, and from that time until the verdict was rendered on Monday last, both sympathizer and opposer were on the qui vive to ascertain the result. The verdict, fixed life sentence upon Coughlin, Burke, and O'Sullivan, which was somewhat of a surprise, as it was generally conceded that it would have to be a death sentence or an absolute acquittal. The verdict in behalf of Kounze of three years, was a serious blow to the "little German" who expected to secure one of not guilty, as did Beggs who was set at liberty. It was certainly a very mixed up case and it was almost impossible for a jury to convict the men of being the actual murderers, and do justice to their own consciences. THE CHIEF does not believe in capital punishment, except in very extreme cases, and does not believe in it then, to any great extent and does not believe much more in that kind of circumstantial evidence that weaves a web around a man's neck, principally because there's a chance to make a reputation for one's self. The evidence while it was extremely damaging the prisoners, yet much of it seems to have been of that kind that would not warrant the jury in bringing in a verdict of capital punishment. While four of the suspects have been found guilty, yet there remains grave fears in the minds of many that the real murderers are still at large. While it is a matter of conjecture with some as to their guilt, it is morally certain that the deep laid plot has not yet been fully developed, and perhaps never will be, and the real culprit's name will probably remain a mystery.
