Usury has ruined our farmers to a large extent, and go where you will in the county you will find the prime cause of most of our failures to have resulted from the farmers having in an evil moment signed their names to some usurious contract that literally was the cause of their ruin. These are unwelcome facts but nevertheless true. Many is the man who has borrowed a small sum of money, and before he was aware of it, bonuses and heavy interest had so accumulated that the original amount, though small, had reached into the hundreds. It is wrong and we hope that the farmers of Webster county will be convinced of the fact. Better to live without much than to have your family robbed by certain money sharks of all you have or can make. Of course the usurer's cry is "would you have a man make an obligation and then go back on it." To this we say no if the debt is an honorable one, but if perchance you are paying 120 per cent interest per annum or half that much, you should seek redress in the courts which is not dishonorable. The law forbids usury, and of course we are aware that we are treading on some ones corns but that cannot be helped, for as a public journal we feel that it is our duty to advise people from becoming so deeply involved in the clutches of those usury takers that it is a hopeless task of ever extricating themselves. The moment one of these fellows get hold of your note they straightway put it into innocent parties hands in order to force you to pay it, bonus and all. In other words they reap the harvest and you are left like the shorn lamb to stand the storms of privations innumerable in trying to pay an obligation that is both unjust and unlawful. Our advice is not to pay bonuses or usury, but go to some honorable man and borrow so that you can pay it back in a life time, but for the sake of your family do not allow yourself to be swallowed up in the yawning abyss that awaits you when you sign bonus notes. Don't do it if you value your future prosperity. Bonuses, like whisky, will ruin you if you make a business of tampering with it.
