DESERVED OFFICIAL RECOGNITION.
The Government Examination of Baking Powders—Royal Officially Reported Pure.

The reports of the Government analysis, as made public from time to time in the official reports, form useful subjects for study. A great deal of attention is devoted to the examination of baking powders, and very properly so, for they are articles of general use, and many of them being so grossly adulterated all possible information should be given to enable consumers to distinguish between the good and the bad.

A large number of these articles have been analyzed, the samples being collected from dealers in all sections. The impurities found were principally alum and lime, both unwholesome. The alum is used in place of cream of tartar because of its low cost. The lime, both tartaric and sulphate being found, was present from the use of improperly refined cream of tartar.

The analysis found and reported the Royal Baking Powder to be pure, free from lime, alum and phosphoric acid, and of high leavening strength. A complete analysis would undoubtedly have shown no baking powder except the Royal entirely free from some one of these objectionable ingredients. This we presume accounts for the lack of leavening power in the other powders, as sometimes complained of by the cook, and for the bitter taste found in the biscuits so frequently complained of by ourselves.

The reasons for the chemical purity of the Royal Baking Powder were recently given in the New York Times, in an interesting description of a new method for refining argols or crude cream of tartar.
