## Supervisors Proceedings.

Board of equalization of Webster county, Neb., convened June 14, 1892, at 10 a. m. W. H. Patterson, Chm. There being no quorum, board adjourned to one o'clock p. m.

1 o'clock p. m., June 14, '92, board convened, Patterson chairman. Members present, 14.

The notice of town board of Guide Rock township, of the appointment of J. F. Watt as supervisor of said township to fill vacancy caused by the resignation of A. H. Cray was read; also the certificate and approval of J. Duffy, county judge of the bond of Mr. Watt.

Moved and carried that Mr. Watt be acknowledged as a member of the board of supervisors from Guide Rock township.

The chairman appointed the following committees:

On equalization of real estate of the county—G. P. Cather, A. McCall and Wright.

On equalization of personal property of the county—C. F. Cather, Kindischer and Watt.

On equalization of real estate of city and villages—Hoffman, Zimmerman, Rassar.

On equalization of real estate and personal property of the city and village with that of the country—Hummel, Holmgren, Garber, Patterson and Foe.

On equalization of personal property of city and villages—Irons, Eglington, Miller.

Oliver McCall appeared before the board on an appeal from the township board of equalization and claimed some of his personal property was assessed too high. Laid over until June 15.

Adjourned to June 15, '92, 9 a. m. 9 a. m., June 15, board convened, 13 members present.

The assessment of Chas. Hunter on 40 head of cattle, assessed in both Walnut creek and Inavale townships, was by the board ordered to be stricken from the assessor's book of Walnut creek.

Adjourned to 1 p. m. same day. 1 p. m. June 15, board convened, Patterson chairman, 14 members present.

M. M. Stern appeared before the board and claimed error in his assessment, which upon investigation it was ordered by the board that his assessment be reduced \$750.

Moved and carried that the assessment of Oliver McCall on personal property be reduced \$67.

Adjourned to June 16, '92, 9 a. m. June 16, '92, 9 a. m., board convened, Patterson chairman, 16 members present.

Mr. A. Roats appeared before the board and claimed that an error was made in the assessment of 35 head of cattle which should have been assessed to Henry Gilham, as said Roats did not have or own said property until May 1st.

Motion by Garber that the assessment of \$133 on said cattle be transferred from A. Roats' assessment to Henry Gilham's assessment. The motion was lost.

Moved by Hummel that the assessment of 35 head of cattle to A. Roats be stricken from the assessor's book, as said assessment was made after the 1st of June and without the knowledge of said Roats. Ayes and nays being called for the result was:

Ayes—Garber, Eglington, Hummel, G. P. Cather, McCall—5.

Nays—Watt, Kindischer, Miller, Wright, Zimmerman, Rassar, Holmgren, C. F. Cather, Hoffman, Irons, Patterson—11. Motion declared lost.

Adjourned to 1 p. m.
