The republican electors of Webster county are requested to send delegates from the several townships to meet in convention at the court house in the city of Red Cloud, Thursday, July 28, 1892, 11 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of selecting 10 delegates to the republican convention to be held at Lincoln, Neb.

Thursday, July 28, 1892.

Ten delegates to the republican senatorial convention; also ten delegates to the state convention, and to nominate one county attorney and one representative for Webster county in the state legislature.

The several townships are entitled to representation as follows: The apportionment being based upon the vote cast for Hon. Geo. H. Hastings for attorney-general in 1890 giving one delegate at large to each township (except the first and second wards of Red Cloud city) and one for each ten votes and the major fraction thereof:

Whereas, the office of Co Coroner of Webster county has become vacant by reason of Dr. Schenck removing from said county; Therefore, it is moved that Joseph W Warren be appointed by this Board to fill vacancy.

Moved that Mr Stanser be appointed coroner to fill vacancy.

Vote was called for by roll call. The result of said vote was: Warren, 8 votes; Stanser, 3 votes.

Joseph W Warren was, by the chair, declared duly appointed to fill the vacancy of coroner for Webster county until the next general election.

Moved and carried that the bridge committee be instructed to go to Cowles and examine the stream where bridge is asked for over Elm Creek, on section line, between 33 and 34, T 3, R 10.

Committee on Ways and Means filed two reports, majority and minority.

We, the majority committee, recommend that the bonds of Webster county issued to the Republican Valley R R in the sum of \$47,500, and maturing Jan 1, 1894, be refunded as provided by chapter 46 of the Statute of Nebraska. Said bonds to be issued in amounts of \$1,000 each, and to run for a term of 20 years, with the option to pay on and after 10 years, at the lowest rate of interest that can be obtained.

A certificate from the Township Clerk of Red Cloud township, certifying that at a meeting of the township Board of said township, it was carried unanimously that the township be divided into road districts as they appear on county records at the time of township organization.

Moved and carried that the district be divided as asked for by town board to take effect on and after January 1, 1893.

We, your committee on bridges, would make the following report: That we have examined the bridge at Guide Rock, and recommend that the south end of the approach of the bridge be repaired.

We would recommend the building of a pile bridge over Elm Creek at or near Cowles, between sec 33 and 34, 3, 10.

Also, we would recommend an appropriation of \$75 to build bridges and culverts on road between sec 32 and 33, 20 and 21, 16 and 17, 8 and 9, 28 and 29, Batin township.

We would recommend an appropriation of \$100 to build a bridge over Farmers Creek in Inavale township, between sections 4 and 9, 2, 12.

We would recommend an appropriation of \$60 to build a bridge over Willow Creek, Pleasant Hill township, between sections 1 and 2, 2, 10.

Also, we recommend an appropriation of \$50 to Batin township, to build culverts and repair roads between sections 22 and 23, 26 and 27, 34 and 35, in town 3, range 11.
