### Supervisor's Proceedings.

Moved and carried that on appropriation of \$125.00 be made to Batin township as recommended by bridge committee and that Supervisor Hoffman be instructed to oversee said work.

Moved and carried that J. Watt, Supervisor of Guide Rock township, be instructed to repair the Guide Rock bridge.

Moved and carried that an appropriation of \$60 be made to build a bridge over Willow Creek between sec 1 and 2, T 2, R 10 as recommended by the committee.

Moved and carried that an appropriation of \$100.00 be appropriated to build a bridge over Farmer's Creek, in Inavale township, as recommended by the committee.

Moved and carried that the bridge committee be instructed to advertise for bids to build and construct a pile bridge over Elm Creek, between sec. 33&34, T 3, R 10, and that said committee be further instructed to let contract to build and construct said bridge according to plans and specifications, to the lowest responsible bidder.

Petition from Oak Creek township for an appropriation of \$200 to build bridge on county line between Webster and Adams counties was indefinitely postponed.

Petition from Guide Rock for an appropriation of \$200 to dress and grade road. The committee on roads reported unfavorably, and the petition was rejected.

Adjourned to 1 p. m.  
July 14, 1 p. m., board convened. Patterson chairman. 14 members present.

C. Schaffnit presented a petition asking Board to relieve him from taxes assessed on goods in 1890, said goods having been sold subject to taxes. Upon investigation it was moved and carried that no action be taken in the matter.

G. W. Hummel appeared before the board and claimed an error in his taxes of 1883. Upon investigation it was moved and carried that the Treasurer be instructed to deduct from the aggregate amount of taxes and interest for the year 1883, \$11.16 from Mr. Hummel's taxes.

Committee on printing recommended that THE NATION be designated as the paper to print the tax sales for this year. Carried.

Moved that \$100 be appropriated to represent Webster county at the World's Fair. After a free and general discussion the motion was lost.

Hr. Holmgren appeared before the Board and asked that a deduction \$9.97 on his taxes of 1886 be made. Upon investigation it was moved and carried that the Treasurer be instructed to deduct from the aggregate amount of taxes and interest the sum of \$9.97.

Committee to settle with County Treasurer made the following report: We, your committee to settle with County Treasurer, for the term of six months, from July 1, to January 6th, 1892, have examined the books and find that the exhibit herein made is correct. Alf McCall, Chm.

Moved and carried that report be accepted.

Motion to reconsider vote on world's fair appropriation was carried.

Motion to amend the original motion of \$100 and that this Board appropriate \$150 to auxiliary Board of State exhibit World's Fair of Webster county.

Ayes: Watt, Foe, Rasser, Holmgren, Garber, C F Cather, Hummel, Irons, McCall, 9.

Nays: Kindesher, Wright, Zimmerman, Eglington, G P Cather, Patterson, 6

Motion declared carried.

Sheriff Geo E Coon was ordered by the Board to take one glandered Jack owned by Erickson and kill the same and present bill for the cash value of said jack.

Adjourned to July 15, 9 a. m.

July 15, 1892, 9 a. m. Board convened. Patterson chairman. 13 members present.

Motion by Garber that C F Cather, and Alf McCall be appointed a committee of two with the advice of County Attorney, who shall have full power to settle all claims between Webster and Thayer counties, in regard to the Williams claim, and report said settlement to this board at its next meeting. The motion prevailed.

D S Schenck Constable, having removed from this city, the office of constable was declared vacant.

Petition of L H Deyo and others for the appointment of J C Womer to fill vacancy of Constable in the city of Red Cloud was received.

Motion that the petition be granted. Ayes: Watt, Foe, Rasser, Garber, C F Cather, Hummel, Irons, McCall, 8.

Nays: Kindesher, Wright, Zimmerman, Holmgren, Eglington, G P Cather, Patterson 7. Motion declared carried.

Adjourned to 1 p. m.

July 15, 1 p. m. Board convened. Patterson chairman, 13 members present.

Resolution; Whereas, information has been received by this board that Henry Lambrecht, a resident of this county, has about \$35 in his hands, belonging to one Jacob Hartman who has been a public charge upon, and a great expense to, this county,

Therefore, it is moved that said Henry Lambrecht be required to pay said money to Webster county, and that the supervisor of Catherton township be instructed to look after this matter. The resolution was adopted.

C W Kaley presented a petition from Rosemont for the opening and establishment of road through the centre of sec 29 4, 9, which was referred to committee on roads.

We, your committee on roads, would recommend the opening and establishing of road through the centre of section 29 4 9 as prayed for in the petition, provided the right of way is secured and no expense to Webster county.

Moved and carried that the clerk be authorized to issue warrant for \$50 in favor of the Commissioner General for case to exhibit Webster county cereals at World's Fair.

Upon investigation the chairman and clerk were ordered to sign the application of Mrs. Elizabeth Carrier for admission to Soldier's Home at Grand Island.

Committee on claims made the following report.

We, your committee on claims, would recommend that the claim of R H Allen of Stillwater for assessing said township for \$97.60 be allowed for \$71.60.

Moved that the report of committee be accepted. Amended by Hummel

that the bill as presented by Mr. Allen be allowed in full.
