Teachers' Meetings.

The subject, Teachers meetings,
may be divided into three parts.

1st. The needs of them; 2d, the
method of conducting them; 3rd, the
result.

In the United States there is no
centralized control over public educa-
tion. There is no general system of
training, or recognized national stand-
ard of qualification for teachers.
Each state, city or educational body
grants its own diplomas, and in some
cases, (though not all) furnishes a
normal school for the training of
teachers. Such special training, how-
ever, is not generally regarded as in-
dispensable.

The lack of a complete normal sys-
tem is partly supplied by Teachers
Institutes, meetings or special gath-
erings for the discussion of principles
and methods, held under the super-
vision of the Superintendent or officials.
Most of our present methods and
ideals are survivals from a time when
the range of available knowledge was
narrower, and when the duties and
responsibilities of life were less com-
plex. In view of the new intellectu-
al and social conditions of our time,
and experience we have gained, this
age has now to inquire: What kind
of knowledge is best worth having,
and what sort of formative and moral
discipline is best fitted to equip a
man for the duties of citizenship, for
the work of active life and the enjoy-
ment of an intelligent home? What
larger share, if any, of the time and
efforts of teachers, should be given to
the training of the hand and of the
senses, as distinguished from the ac-
quisition of the sort of knowledge
and of metal cultivation which are
derivable from books? What other
and better means of communicating
knowledge, and of making it more at-
tractive can yet be devised? And
how may we as teachers become more
worthy of the position we now hold,
are some of the questions demanding
a solution. Hence the need of teach-
ers' meetings.

Methods of conducting Teachers'
meetings are numerous. Though in
none of the methods should we lose
sight of the object in view, and the
end to be attained. Teachers of any
township or locality may form local
Reading Circles, agree upon date and
place of meeting, and elect officers;
and as our meetings are what we
make them, to have an interesting
meeting we must all be interested.
And all live teachers should attend
the meetings, and take part in the
discussions. In connection with the
teachers' meetings, I would recom-
mend evening meetings for patrons of
the school where together with the
teachers they may help talk over the
needs of the pupils, the advantages
and advancement of education. The
more intelligent class of people have
already awakened to the fact that if
they wish their children to obtain an
education, they must lend a helping
hand to the faithful teacher in this
glorious work.

We should not fail to notice the
importance of self-cultivation. It is
true, this duty is required of all per-
sons, but especially of the teacher,
from the simple fact that the nature of
his employment demands it. Teach-
ers' meetings and gatherings for the
discussions of principles and methods
are excellent places for self-cultiva-
tion. In order to interest the chil-
dren in their studies, how important
it is, that he should store his mind
with choice thoughts of the wise, and
inspire them with a thirst for knowl-
edge. How necessary that he should
be a living example of the advantages
and enjoyments that education alone

can bestow. For how naturally will
the pupil follow the footsteps of his
teacher. Then how all important it
is that he seize every opportunity of
improving himself and becoming a
teacher worthy of the highest appre-
bation and richest rewards of all.
Though he seldom receive his due re-
ward from the people, yet in my mind
if he will look on the bright side of
the picture, and see the moral and in-
tellectual growth gained from his em-
ployment, surely this will afford suffi-
cient reward to inspire him with abun-
dant courage and satisfaction.

Then let us press forward with the
blessed assurance that if we do not
receive the rewards justly due us here
we have the bright hope that the
faithful teacher enjoys the "approval
of Heaven," and if a more glorious
crown is held in reserve for one rath-
er than another, it is for him, who un-
cheered by worldly praise and with-
out the prospect of a sufficient re-
ward from his fellowmen, cheerfully
does with patience "A whatsoever his
hand findeth to do," toward raising
his fellow beings to happiness and
Heaven. And when gathered at last
on the other shore he shall meet
countless numbers, instructed by his
wise council, and profited by his pure
example who "shall rise up and call
him blessed."
