OUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS.—The time has arrived when any successful efforts toward intellectual cultivation, deserve the consideration and praise of the people generally, and it is universally known that the brilliant representative of any profession, is an indefatigable worker, and the result of scrupulous application. The successful journalist, the astute politician, the progressive physician, the brilliant lawyer, the versatile theologian, and the scholastic author, have all at one time labored under identically the same peculiar adversities which attend the young student when he enters elementary algebra, or gets his first lessons in "Salus." Thus our attention is called to the various achievements in educational work in this country and we point with pride to the public schools of Red Cloud. It was our pleasure the other day to call a few minutes at the upper school and while there gathered a few points which certainly deserves more than casual notice, and bespeak for the public schools of Red Cloud a grand future. The schools are at present presided over by a thoroughly competent corps of teachers, the patrons are well pleased with the pupils' progress, and the schools have never since their founding been in a more prosperous and highly satisfactorily condition than they are at the present time. Of last years graduates of which there were ten, five are successful teachers at the present time with lucrative salaries, and four of them are in college striving to attain a still higher knowledge of difficult branches, and promote the educational welfare of the country generally. This simply shows that when young people close their school career in Red Cloud, they enter their respective fields of labor with sanguine enthusiasm and prove conclusively that their instruction in school has been something useful and something that pertained to culture and refinement. The senior class which will graduate this year, consist of ten bright young ladies and gentlemen, who are striving for excellence in the commencement exercises at the close of school. The present faculty is comprised of the following well-known educators.
Prof. G. M. Caster, Supt.; Miss C. A. Gorby, principal; Mrs. Case, asst. principal; Miss Jennie Waddell, room 4; Miss Lulu Warner, room 3; Miss Nellie West, room 2; Miss Mary Nye, room 1. In the south school Prof. H. C. Probascio is principal. Miss Delia Schaffnit is teacher in room 3; Miss Dora Henderson in room 2; Miss Laura Williams in room 1. The kindergarten is successfully taught by Miss Rhoda Waddell. In all due respect to Prof. Caster it will not be insipid to state that he is a polished gentleman of much erudition having graduated at Harvard and has since been engaged in educational work both here and in Europe. His peculiar taste for literary and educational work, and his assiduous efforts in cooperation with the efficient teachers under him has made the schools what they are among the best in the country. The total enrollment at the beginning of last month was 475 pupils, but will now exceed 500, with numerous matriculations each week. In the year ending '90, there were 3188 cases of tardiness; '91 not recorded; in the year ending '92, the first year under the present superintendent, 1040; and the last year through the strenuous efforts of the superintendent and faculty, the tardy marks were reduced to 680. Prof. Caster has devised a plan to encourage punctuality by the presentation of banners to the rooms recording the least tardiness, and in the last contest the ranks of Miss Nye of the north school, and Miss Schaffnit of the south school, were accorded equal honors, both being perfect in attendance and punctuality. Lack of space precludes a thorough portrayal of the various methods employed in conducting the schools, but we can refer again with impunity to the teachers as the most able instructors, and without one single exception they are gifted with high intellectual attainments. Red Cloud is proud of her schools, and under such favorable auspices as they are now progressing, the Red Cloud schools will soon be second to none in the state.

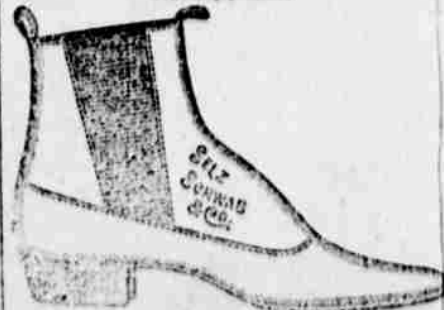
