PROTEST OF EMPLOYEES

Employees of the Union Pacific Go Into Court.

WAGE TABLES WERE MISLEADING.

Petition Attacks Judge Dundy's Right to Issue an Order Restraining Employees From Striking—Believe Receivers Were Appointed For the Express Purpose of Cutting Salaries.

DENVER, Feb. 7.—Van Arsdale & Esteb, attorneys for the employees of the Union Pacific, presented a petition from Wyoming employees to Judges Biner and Hallett. The petition first attacks the right of Judge Dundy to issue a schedule while a contract was in existence with the Union Pacific employees.

Then follow tables in which the wages paid on the Union Pacific are compared in detail with those of the Santa Fe, the Denver and Rio Grande and other roads, and the petition states that the tables furnished the court in Omaha were purposely made with a view to misleading. The districts in Wyoming are taken up one by one and each order of the employees states how the new schedule affects them.

The petition to the United States court for relief is pronounced a long and laborious method of redressing wrongs and which the men are totally unfamiliar with. The corporation being rich and powerful, it is asserted, would carry to a higher court all matters that were decided against them.

A. P. A. LECTURER ARRESTED.

Charge of Libel Preferred Against Professor Sims at Appleton, Wis.

APPLETON, Wis., Feb. 7.—Professor Sims, A. P. A. lecturer, who was mobbed at Oshkosh, Jan. 17, was arrested and taken off a train here on a charge of libel, preferred by Peter Reuter, mayor of Kaukauna. Sims left Oshkosh Tuesday evening with a delegation of 250 members of the Oshkosh American Protective association lodge in two cars on the Northwestern railway.

To prevent Sims' appearance at Kaukauna, Reuter instituted civil suit for libel against Sims and a warrant was issued for his arrest. The sheriff served a warrant on Sims as he came through Appleton. The American Protective association delegation, headed by the band, followed through the streets. Sims gave \$2,500 bond for his appearance.

Large crowds gathered at the depot when Sims was arrested and there was considerable excitement. He nor his party made no resistance. During the excitement, one stone was thrown through a car window, inflicting a scalp wound upon an unknown passenger.

Loss of an Iowa Editor.

IOWA CITY, Ia., Feb. 7.—Fire partially destroyed the \$10,000 resident and elegant library of H. S. Fairall, editor of The Republican. The insurance is \$3,600, which but partially covers the loss. Only two months ago The Republican office was ruined by fire.

Explosion of a Tank of Gasol 3c.

WAYNE, Neb., Feb. 7.—The tank of the gasoline engine in the mill of Newton & Co. exploded. Engineer Rose was fatally burned. Frank Bell and O. B. Kootright were badly scalded, but will recover. Fire, resulting from the explosion, did about \$1,500 damage.

ARKANSAS CITY, Kan., Feb. 7.—The officers and directors of the North and South railroad will meet in this city Thursday, Feb. 8th, to perfect plans for the preliminary work.

The Shields' Held For Murderer.

JEFFERSON, Ia., Feb. 7.—The grand jury returned a verdict of murder in the second degree against the two Shields boys, and their bonds were placed at \$3,000 each.

Roofers Return to Work.

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 7.—The 300 roofers who have been on a strike for about a week, went back to work again under the same rates per hour as last year's contract.

Violated Postal Laws.

KEOKUK, Ia., Feb. 7.—Judge Woolson sentenced W. A. Bell to 18 months in the penitentiary and to pay a fine of \$250, and J. H. Wills to six months in the penitentiary and a fine of \$150 for using the mails for fraudulent purposes at Sigourney.

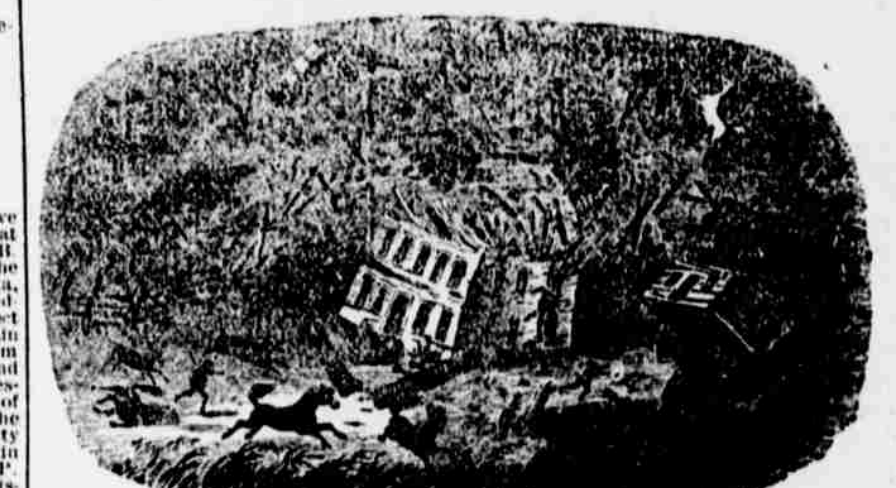
