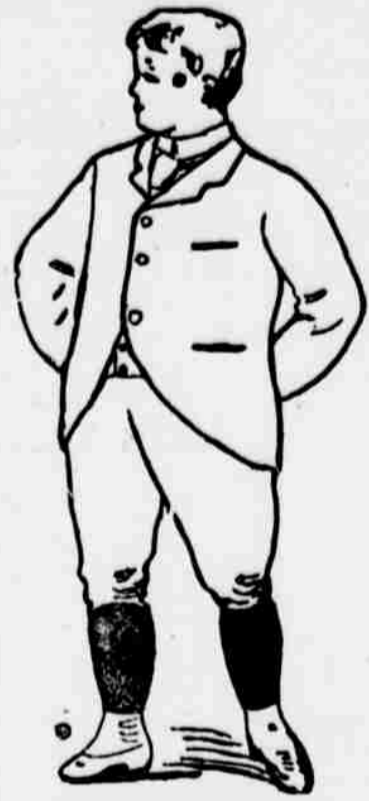

**EVENTS OCCURRING IN ALL SECTIONS SUMMARIZED.**

The Many Happenings of Seven Days Reduced From Columns to Lines—Everything but Facts Eliminated For Our Readers' Convenience.

**Thursday, May 31.**

The Pacific coast people are beginning to denounce the Japanese. Citizen Train expresses himself concerning some misstatements about himself.

A company of Iowa troops has been ordered to Mutchaknoek, where the colored miners are in danger from strikers.

J. C. and George Mickles were identified at Galesburg, Ills., as the men who swindled farmers at Toluca out of \$500.

Turner, Ills., tramps must either leave town or work on the streets with ball and chain.

The jail at Jonesboro, Tenn., was burned by the prisoners, one of whom escaped.

The Iowa district conference of the African Methodist church is in session at Monmouth, Ills.

One negro was killed and four were seriously wounded by whitecaps in Pointe Coupee parish, Louisiana.

The petrified body of a woman bearing a wound indicating a violent death was found near Jerseyville, Ills.

The convention of Railway Employees at New York adopted a platform of principles and adjourned sine die.

An official of the Chicago health department was badly beaten for trying to put up a "smallpox" placard.

A posse with bloodhounds are on the trail of the Taylor murderers near Cañon, Ia.

Town Marshal Henry Weston of Bellevue, Ia., was convicted at Maquoketa of manslaughter for killing Hiram Hoover. The case will be appealed.

Director Ephraim Young, who misappropriated funds of the Philadelphia Springs Garden bank, was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary.

Eighteen violators of the Illinois fish law were caught at East Dubuque by Chief Warden Blow and Assistant Albert Link. They were convicted and fined.

**Friday, June 1.**

Mrs. Sarah Luttrell died at Rushville, Ills., aged 102.

Mrs. William Hall was probably fatally injured at Akron, O., by a bolt of lightning. Her house was burned to the ground.

Ex-Consul General Crawford and Mrs. Crawford started from St. Petersburg for a tour of the world.

A Massachusetts man has been at Norfolk, Neb., looking over the ground with the idea of building a paper mill.

Ed L. Fliesbeck dropped dead at Keokuk, Ia., while sitting in a chair holding his little daughter. Cause, heart disease.

Charles Greenley, 39 years old, while attempting to catch on to a wild train passing through Brush Creek, Ia., was killed.

Twenty thousand persons witnessed the laying of the corner stone of the new \$300,000 city hall at Bay City, Mich.

John A. Shackelford, a Logansport, Ind., editor, has begun habeas corpus proceedings to recover possession of his wife, who is held captive by her stepfather.

A great crowd witnessed the spring review of the troops by Emperor William on Tempelhofer field in Berlin.

John Baughn of Randolph, Neb., is about to erect a 60,000 bushel elevator.

Young Catholics objected to the inscription on a wreath laid on the statue of Joan of Arc by Paris Masons and a riot followed in which many persons were injured.

**Saturday, June 2.**

Three cases of smallpox were taken to the pesthouse at Lincoln, Neb.

The 23d annual session of the grand lodge Knights of Pythias of Wisconsin convened at Racine.

Archbishop Hennessy is expected to visit Lincoln again soon to attend to Bishop Bonaeum's troubles.

Mrs. Lavinia Whiteman has sued John Krueger, a saloonkeeper at Chesterton, Ind., for \$5,000 for selling her husband liquor. Whiteman, while intoxicated, was killed by a Lake Shore train.

The first imperial convolve of the Sheikhs of the Orient began in Omaha.

The Taylor brothers were seen and recognized in Van Buren county, Iowa. A posse is in pursuit.

The prohibition state convention adopted a platform and nominated candidates at Carrollton, Mo.

Colonel Henry S. Dean, ex-commander of the Michigan G. A. R. has been appointed regent of the university.

Robert Seidel of Paterson, N. J., the saloonkeeper at whose place dynamite is said to have been made, has been arrested.
