

POPULIST CONVENTION.

The Populists Meet in Convention and Nominate a Ticket. Several Jars and a McKeighan Speech.—Delegates, &c.

The populist voters of Webster county, met in convention at the court house last Saturday. The convention was called to order by H L Hopkins, on motion J. L. Grandstaff was elected temporary chairman and J. H. Walsh, secretary. After committees on credentials and permanent organization had been appointed the convention adjourned to 1.30 p m. On reassembling F. A. Sweezy was elected chairman, Harry Hopkins, secretary.

On motion of VanWert the chairman of each delegation was selected as a committee to select members to state convention. While this committee was out ex Congressman McKeighan was called for and responded in substance about as follows:

"Mr. Chairman and gentlemen: My health is poor and I did not think of making a speech. For myself I care less for what the party resolves than I do for what they do. The issues of the Independent party are well cut and well defined. A new party was needed and the Independent party filled the bill. The old parties could not do the people justice. I would not be a demagogue, for that would be to deceive the people. Most of the populists were democrats or republicans, and had joined the new party for reform. The populist party is the educator of the people. The free coinage of silver is one of the necessities of the times and must be considered. I have discovered what a crank means. It is a fellow who differs with you. The gold standard can not but help bring the poor people into subjection to organized wealth. The principle of the populist party are dearer to me than anything else. The silver question is the great and all important question of the day. The democratic party is dead and the republican party will soon follow. It is only through the populist party that we can hope for redress. The old parties will not help us. At the conclusion of McKeighan's talk the committee on delegates reported.

WHEREAS, The state of Nebraska was admitted into the Union in the year 1867 and the fees and salaries of most of the officers were established at that time, and that the mints of the United States were at that time open to the free coinage of both gold and silver, the fees and salaries were thereupon established on that basis, and were paid by the taxpayers on their relative value of their productions and labor, and

WHEREAS, The fees of the county treasurer, county judge, county clerk and some others were established in 1878, and were presumably based on the value of the productions and price of labor at that time, and also in reference to fees already established, and

WHEREAS, The average price of production and labor has declined on an average from the prices of 1867 over 75 per cent and the prices of 1878 of nearly 50 per cent, and

WHEREAS, We believe the demonetization of silver in 1873, to be the leading cause of this decline in the value of production and labor, and has been the sole cause of the appreciation of money, and

WHEREAS, We believe in equal privileges for all and special privileges for none, and

WHEREAS, We believe that this growing discrepancy of appreciation of fees and salaries on one side and the debased value of productions and labor on the other, the leading cause of so many willing to leave the different avenues of production and labor to become office holders, and in their strife to become such, form the combines and machinery that sets aside the real will of the people, and

WHEREAS, We believe the free coinage of both gold and silver will be thereby advanced on a solid foundation, when the private interests of our office holders are not enhanced in value by demonetization, and that it is only through them can our laws be so made or amended. It is

RESOLVED, That the pay of all public officers in fees and salaries be re-adjusted to the level of the prices of production and labor in the states, counties and districts where the same are to be paid, also,

RESOLVED, That we nominate and support only such men for officers as that will pledge themselves to work for this end, and that the county convention memorialize the state and national convention to incorporate this reform.

On motion the first ballot was to be informal and the vote for treasurer resulted in bringing out a lot of candidates for that office.

The formal ballot resulted in the nomination of Ed Funk of Rosemont.

J H Bailey of Red Cloud was nominated for county clerk over numerous other candidates.

The next office was that of clerk of the district court. It took two ballots to decide that Clarence Stout should be the man.

For sheriff Bud Norris led and secured the plum easily, though the convention refused to make it unanimous.

For coroner there was a host of candidates: S Bayles, Dr Fulkerson, Capt Houchin, Ed Solomon, G Hite, W Reed, and Joe Garber. S Bayles was the nominee.

For county judge, Houchin moved that Jas Duffy be the unanimous choice and the motion carried.

Prof McCrary was nominated for the position of county superintendent of schools.

Frank Kuehn was nominated surveyor.

A motion to instruct delegates for Beall brought Chairman Sweezy to his feet with an objection. He said he had been a candidate for district judge for over six months. The motion was withdrawn in consequence.

The convention then adjourned.
