WEATHER FORECASTS.

Furnished Expressly for The Red Cloud Chief.

(Copyrighted, 1896, by W. T. Foster.) St. Joseph, Mo., Feb. 29.—My last bulletin gave forecasts of the storm waves to cross the continent from 29th to Mar 4 and the next will reach the Pacific coast about 5th, cross the west of Rockies country by close of 6th, great central valleys 7th to 9th, and eastern states 10th.

The warm wave will cross the west of Rockies country about March 5th, great central valleys 7th, eastern states 9th. Cool wave will cross the west of Rockies country about March 8th, great central valleys 10th, eastern states 12th.

The third disturbance of March will be of unusual force and importance, and will probably cause tornadoes in some of the southern states.

This disturbance will reach the Pacific coast about 12th, cross the west of Rockies country by close of 13th, great central valleys 14th to 16th, eastern states 17th.

This storm, including the low and its counterpart, high, following, will take a southern route, and in some of the southern states serious results from killing frosts are probable.

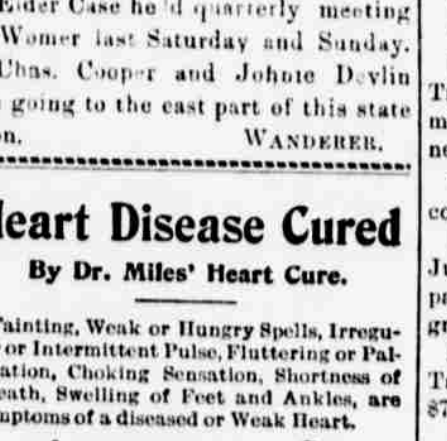
I give special warning of a blizzard in the upper Missouri valleys not far from March 16th. B. Missouri valleys, I mean all the country drained by the Missouri river and its tributaries.

The effects of this storm will be felt in every part of the United States, but its central path will probably lie west of the Missouri river, through the Indian Territory and thence eastward through the southern states, with rains south and east of its central path, sleet, snow and cold weather on the north side of its track.

The warm wave preceding the last named storm will cross the west of Rockies country about 12th, great central valleys 14th, eastern states 16th. Following the low or warm wave will be a cold wave or high, and it will cross the west of Rockies country about 15th, great central valleys 17th, eastern states 19th.

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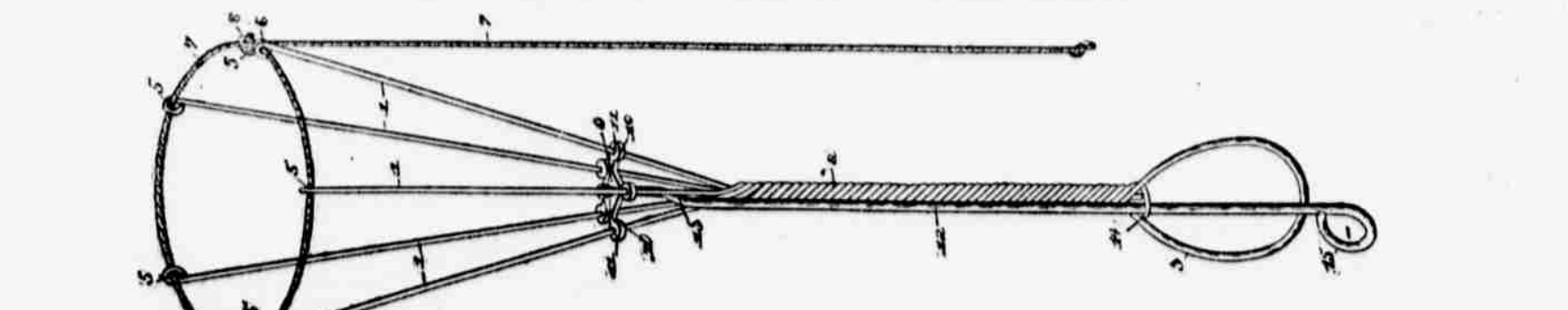
