HOW - TO - SAVE - MONEY

Description of the Girtanner Attachment

For burning Straw, Hay, Corn, Cobs, Corn Stalks, Etc.

HOW IT OPERATES.

FIRST. It is a scientific fact that seventy-five per cent of the fuel burned in the ordinary way is lost. Nearly all of this loss is averted by feeding the fuel from an air-tight main line, charring the same and consuming the smoke, thereby making complete combustion.

FIFTH. Ten pounds of straw, weeds or trash, or twenty pounds of cobs, will burn from three to six hours, with sufficient heat for cooking, or for heating the rooms.

Seventy-five per cent of the strength of the fuel ordinarily escapes in the smoke. By this method of burning, the tars, pitches and carbons which are contained in the smoke are utilized. It also avoids the gas, smoke and soot which is created by the ordinary method of burning coal.
