Commissioners Proceedings. Board met on Monday, February 21, present, F. E. Payne, Wm. May, Geo. P. Webber, Jerome Vance, also county attorney.

Petition of J. W. McClaren of Potsdam township to be appointed constable granted as prayed.

Report of John McCallum, chairman of the soldier's relief commission accepted and ordered placed on file.

Petition of John Coon and others from Garfield township for road granted as prayed for. Road commencing at the southeast corner of section thirteen in township one; north of range eleven west of the 6th P. M. and running thence north on the section line one mile to the northeast corner of section thirteen to intersect the road running east and west on the section line and vacating the oil road running diagonally across the east half of section thirteen, town one, range eleven.

Petition of John Rutledge and others from Inavale township for \$100 to fix road in road district No. 31, granted as prayed. To be used as follows: \$75 on section line road between sections 22 and 23, and 26 and 27, town 2, range 12, due north of Inavale, also \$25 to be used on same line north, between south half of sections 14 and 15, all in township 2 12.

Petition of S. Walz as road overseer for road district No. 35, Oak Creek township was granted.

Petition of Clark Phillips for road overseer, road district 35, rejected.

Moved and carried that the county treasurer is hereby authorized to issue tax certificate on lot 21, block 4, Gruesell's addition to Blue Hill for 1896 taxes and all prior taxes for the sum of \$92.79.

E. J. Peterson of Catherton township on recommendation of F. E. Payne was appointed justice of the peace of Catherton.

Board adjourned to meet Wednesday morning, February 23d, at 9 a. m.

Board met Wednesday morning pursuant to adjournment with all members present.

On motion erroneous assessment of Bank of Guide Rock was corrected and treasurer was authorized to accept \$109.08 for the 1897 taxes.

Petition of James Burden for a typewriter for use in the office of the district clerk granted as prayed for and is hereby authorized to purchase one.

Petition of P. M. Cochrane and others from Inavale township, road district No. 4, to appropriate \$50 was referred to F. E. Payne.

Petition of G. M. Copelen and others asking for the location of a road line between sections 10 and 11, township 1 north of range 9, and extending thence south to the Republican river was presented to the board, considered and the county clerk ordered to proceed according to law.

It is hereby ordered and adjudged by the board that it is expedient for public utility to open up the road on section line between sections thirty-one and thirty-two, town three, range twelve west, providing that any damages claimed by reason of opening such road shall be appraised and allowed as per statutory provision and provided further the county surveyor is hereby directed to discover and perpetuate the existing government corners along said line by planting monuments of some durable material with suitable witnesses thereto and make record of the same.

Bond of Elmer Harvey of Inavale township was approved as justice of the peace.

Bond of J. W. Sampson as constable for Potsdam township was approved.

Bond of J. A. Anderson as road overseer, Dist. No. 47, was approved.

Bond of Philip Zimmerman as road overseer was approved.

Bond of E. J. Peterson of Catherton township for justice of the peace was approved.

E. J. Solomon of Harmony was appointed justice of the peace.

Moved and carried that O. E. Raney be allowed to pasture twelve head of young cattle in the poor farm pasture.

Petition of Geo. E. Coon and others for \$100 to be used on road on section thirteen and eighteen, town one, range eleven west, Line township. On motion \$75 was appropriated for said road.

Moved and carried that Jerome

Vance is hereby authorized to cause to be furnished William Hathaway not to exceed \$5 per month for supplies out of the county poor fund.

Board adjourned to meet Thursday, February 24th, 1898, at 9 a. m.

Board met Thursday morning, pursuant to adjournment with all members present.

County board authorized F. E. Payne to purchase posts and wire to fence the poor farm.

Bond of J. W. McClaren for constable of Potsdam township approved.

Claim of Mrs. Allie Tennant was laid over.

Claim of John J. Zajic for \$17.10 rejected.

On motion the district clerk was ordered to pay the fees now in his, or which may hereafter come into his possession for work done by ex-county treasurer and ex-county clerk into the county treasury to the credit of the party that did the work as excess fees.

Board adjourned to meet Friday, February 25th, at 9 a. m.

Board met Friday, February 25th, with all members present.

It is hereby ordered by the board of county commissioners in session that the county treasurer be and is hereby ordered to bring suit against L. Baun for delinquent personal taxes for the year 1897.

Moved and carried that Geo. P. Webber repair the bridge one and one-half miles south of Cowles till there can be a new bridge built.

Moved and carried that Wm. A. May is hereby instructed to purchase the machinery for the poor farm.

"We the committee appointed in the matter of the settlement of the judgment against the State Bank of Blue Hill, recommend that the county accept the State Bank building and all fixtures and furniture therein, including the burglar proof safe, in full settlement of the judgment against said bank, and that the county attorney be authorized to settle same at any time when the county gets title to the above property.

Wm. A. May, Jerome Vance, Committee.

Report of committee accepted by the board and county attorney authorized accordingly.

Moved and carried that county clerk is authorized to draw a county warrant in favor of E. B. Smith for \$75 to be paid to A. C. Hosmer to pay for lots 21, 22, 23 and 24 in block 7, city of Red Cloud. Also a warrant to be drawn to the county treasurer for \$48.17 to be applied on taxes on lots 21, 22, 23 and 24, block 7, Red Cloud, Nebraska.

Claim of J. S. White for \$372.65 was referred to the county attorney. By advice of the county attorney the board made the following order to wit: When J. S. White complies with the order of the county board of commissioners of September 1st, 1897, to allow said claim.

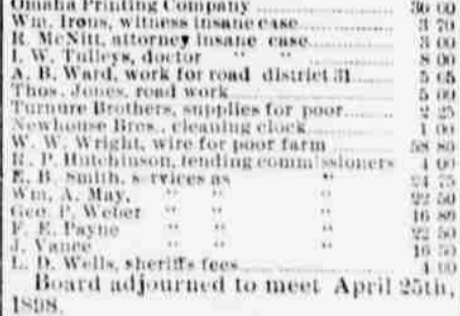
