There has been an unusual amount of sunshine, and the conditions were very favorable for harvesting small grain, which is about completed. Threshing is in progress in many sections, and the yield is reported fair, with good quality. Corn has made good growth, and still holds a good color, but needs rain at this period, especially as it has begun to tassel. Chinch bugs are reported in some sections, but the damage is generally slight. Pastures are reported as being dried up in some localities.
