Infected Chinch Bugs.
The following letter received by Jno. Eerner is published for the benefit of parties desiring to procure infected chinch bugs. Letters should be addressed to Lawrence Bruner, Lincoln, Nebraska, in care of State University. LINCOLN, Neb, July 18, 1898. Mr. John Eerner, Red Cloud, Neb. My Dear Sir—Your favor of the 15th at hand, and I send you herewith a small box of infected chinch bugs, along with directions for their use. If any of your neighbors ask whether it can be obtained at the university, you might inform them that by sending ten cents we could furnish them with a box of the infection. The crop bulletin of this state may be summarized as follows from the report of the state observer: The week has been one of unusually even conditions, the daily average temperature being about two degrees below the normal. The daily maximum temperatures were generally below ninety degrees. There has been a decided deficiency in precipitation, there being only a few scattered showers; the greater portion of the state had no precipitation. There has been an unusual amount of sunshine, and the conditions were very favorable for harvesting small grain, which is about completed. Threshing is in progress in many sections, and the yield is reported fair, with good quality. Corn has made good growth, and still holds a good color, but needs rain at this period, especially as it has begun to tassel. Chinch bugs are reported in some sections, but the damage is generally slight. Pastures are reported as being dried up in some localities.
