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IT'S ALL GUESSWORK

OFFICIAL COUNT MAY BE NEEDED ON STATE TICKET

The Race Altogether Too Close for the Comfort of Both Parties—Complete Returns From Half the Counties Mysterify the Result.

Nebraska this, Thursday, morning is a state of doubt and uncertainty. The gains which the republicans depended upon to give Hayward a majority of 4,000 fell off slightly, when complete county returns began coming in.

The results given below show that it is a close race, and that the successful party will get into power on the smallest kind of a margin. There is plenty of talk about the need of official count to determine the result on all of the candidates, and this talk is not confined to one party, either.

The footings of thirty-seven of these counties give Hayward 43,583 and Poynter 45,817.

The Legislature.

The legislature is still claimed by both parties, but neither is certain. It appears, from the latest returns, that the legislature will be close on joint ballot. This, Tuesday, morning, the republicans claim the senate certain and base their claims to the house on the fact that some districts are close and others are incomplete.

The fusionists claim the legislature on joint ballot by a majority of from five to ten.

Congressional.

The returns for congress are still wanting in completeness. The republicans are not making many claims outside of the First and Second districts.

In the first district each of the seven counties in the district gave Mr. Burgett a majority. His majority in the district will probably reach 3,000.

In the Second district complete returns from 109 precincts out of the 154 in the district give Mercer 10,619 and Hitecock 9,206. It is noticeable that Hitecock gained where he least expected it, and lost where he had builded great expectations.

Nine of the eighteen counties in the third district give Norris, republican, 7,190; Robinson, fusion, 7,531.

Seven counties out of eleven in the fourth district give Hinchshaw 10,518; Stark 9,044.

Five counties out of five in the fifth district give Brown 6,439; and 9,044.

KANSAS IS REPUBLICAN.

The Entire Fusion State Ticket Defeated in Sunflower State.

SAVED ONE CONGRESSMAN.

All of the Populist Members, With the Exception of Ridgeley, Probably Lost—The Country Vote Did It—Early Returns Favored Leedy.

TOPEKA, Kan., Nov. 10.—Kansas has elected Stanley and the entire Republican state ticket. The only thing sure for the Fusionists is Ridgeley for Congress in the Third district. They may pull out in the Sixth and Fourth, but it is only a glimmering hope and while waiting in their committee headquarters for returns that do not come, they are almost ready to concede all except the Third. The Republicans also elect from 80 to 100 members of the house, which gives them a majority of the legislature on joint ballot and insures a Republican state printer.

At 2 o'clock this morning all signs pointed to the election of the Fusion state ticket by a majority of 10,000 or 15,000 and the Fusionists were betting the Republicans to a standstill. This confidence seemed to have been warranted by the returns from the larger cities, which surprised both parties by giving Fusion gains. It was in the cities that the Republicans looked for their big vote. The Fusionists conceded this, except in the big towns along the Missouri river, where the resubmission sentiment is strong, and expected to make offsetting gains in the country precincts. The result, however, was the reverse of these calculations. The Fusionists gained in nearly all the more populous centers, while the Republicans gained in the country.

It was from the cities that the first returns came, and Leedy's gains were so unexpected that the fusionists believed it was a landslide for their ticket, and claimed everything. The Republicans were almost willing to concede the claims of the fusion committee, but later the country precincts began to report, and Republican gains since are so uniform all over the state that there is no doubt of Stanley's election, although only a small fraction of the total vote of the state has been heard from.

The fusion committee hangs to the hope that the tide may turn, but no returns are coming to fusion headquarters while telegraph boys keep the stairway of the Republican headquarters hot. Mort Albaugh, chairman of the Republican state committee, claims the election of Stanley and the Republican state ticket by from 10,000 to 10,000, not less than eighty members of the house and seven or eight members of Congress. Taylor Riddle, fusion chairman, claims the state by 2,500 and three Congressmen. John W. Breidenthal, former Populist chairman, while not yet giving up the state, says Republican success was possible by the failure of the full Fusion vote to go to the polls. He claims that the Republican gains were not due to a change of sentiment among the people, but to the apathy of a large element of the Fusion vote.

The remarkable gains made by Leedy in the larger cities are an unerring sign of the growth of resubmission sentiment in the state. The home rule or liberal Republicans of these towns were unwilling to trust Mr. Stanley on the liquor question, although his friends, and even he himself, gave pledges that home rule should be continued in the cities. The liberals voted for Leedy.

An emphatic evidence of this is given in Atchison county, formerly a strong Republican county. Two years ago Morrill carried it by 702. Yesterday Leedy carried it by 140. Another evidence is shown in Leavenworth, where Leedy made big gains. It is possible that Wyandotte would have made similar gains for Leedy if a full vote had been cast, but by a Republican coup about 1,700 packing house employees did not register, and in consequence a fair expression of the people was not given in that community.

In the coal counties the miners carried out their threat to scratch the Fusion ticket on account of their hatred for McGrath, Governor Leedy's state mine inspector. Cherokee, Crawford and Osage ordinarily are Fusion strongholds, but the returns show heavy losses this year.

In Franklin county, for years reliably Fusion, Senator Sheldon and P. P. Elder, Populist bellwethers, who have been fighting Leedy, made their influence felt, and this year the Republicans claim the county.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Nov. 9.—Returns from forty-one out of fifty-eight precincts in Wyandotte county, Kansas, give Stanley 3,055, Leedy 2,603. The precincts yet to hear from will not materially change the result and Stan-

ley's majority in Wyandotte county will be very close to Morrill's majority in 1896, which was 360.

The Republicans elect their entire county ticket and three representatives.

Stuart Probably Elected.

TOPEKA, Nov. 10.—Unless later returns from county precincts in Nemaha county make unexpected changes W. I. Stewart is elected judge of the Twenty-second judicial district by a slight majority. Leedy's most conservative estimate of his majority after figuring all reports that are in, is 200. Stuart went off in Doniphan county with 600 majority. Schilling's fight gave Fallon 100 in Hiawatha and Emory's friends in Seneca carried the city against Stuart 14 votes. Horton offset it by giving Stuart 14 majority.

Jerry Simpson Is Defeated.

HUTCHINSON, Kan., Nov. 10.—Practically complete returns from the Seventh congressional district received by the Hutchinson News show that Chester I. Leedy, Republican, is elected by about 2,000 majority over Jerry Simpson, Populist. The Republicans gain about nine members of the legislature in the Seventh district.

Miller Ahead in All Counties.

EMPORIA, Kan., Nov. 10.—Chairman Martindale, of the Congressional committee, has telegrams from Butler, Morris and Greenwood counties, Populist two years ago, indicating that Miller has carried each of them by substantial majorities.

Calderhead in the Fifth.

ABILENE, Kan., Nov. 10.—Reports from the Fifth district indicate Calderhead's election by 600 to 800.

Fusionist Governor in Minnesota.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 10.—Unofficial and complete, but apparently reliable, returns indicate John Lind, Fusion candidate, has been elected governor of Minnesota by a plurality of 10,000.

Five out of seven congressmen are Republican. The Sixth and Seventh districts are close and claimed by both sides.

James Gray, Fusionist, was elected mayor of Minneapolis by perhaps 5,000, the largest plurality ever given in this city to a candidate not a Republican.

Nebraska Goes Republican.

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 10.—Belated precinct returns to-day continue to indicate that Nebraska has turned a political somersault and landed in the Republican column. Three hundred and seventeen precincts outside of Lincoln and Omaha give Hayward, Republican, for governor, 29,494; Poynter, fusion, 26,362, a net Republican gain of 3,132. If this gain is maintained Hayward will carry the state by over 40,000. The First and Second Congressional districts are Republican; the Third and Sixth, fusion, and the Fourth and Fifth in doubt.

A Republican will be elected to succeed United States Senator Allen.

Republicans Sweep Delaware.

WILMINGTON, Del., Nov. 10.—According to complete returns from the state, with the exception of a few districts, the next legislature will stand: Republicans 29, Democrats 23. The Republicans will thus elect a senator to succeed United States Senator Gray, Democrat. Congressman Handy, Democrat, was defeated by John Hoffecker, Republican, by a majority that will not be less than 2,000. By the same margin the Republicans elect Dr. L. Heiser Ball state treasurer and John A. Lingo state auditor. They also elect their county tickets in each of the three counties. It was a clean Republican sweep.

Illinois 30,000 Republican.

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—Returns from every county in the state indicate the election of Whittemore, Republican, for state treasurer, by a plurality of nearly 30,000. Enough legislative returns have been received to show that the lower house will be Democratic by about six votes, and the senate Republican by about eleven votes. In Cook county, aside from Congressmen, the entire Republican ticket, with possibly one or two exceptions, was elected by pluralities ranging from 5,000 to 5,000. The county was carried for McKinley by nearly 70,000.

Two Republican Members in Tennessee.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Nov. 10.—The majority of McMillin, Democrat, for governor, over Fowler, Republican, is estimated at from 10,000 to 30,000. The Democrats have a majority of the legislature. The Republicans have carried the First and Second congressional districts, the other eight giving Democratic majorities.

Democrats to Elect Utah's Senator.

SALT LAKE, Utah, Nov. 10.—The Democrats have elected Roberts to Congress and carried the legislature, which will elect a United States Senator. Returns from sixty-two districts in the city and state give Baskin, Democrat for supreme judge, 5,070; Zane, Republican, 4,891.

Democrats Sweep Kentucky.

LOUISVILLE, Nov. 10.—The Democrats of Kentucky won a decisive victory by electing nine and possibly ten congressmen out of eleven and prevented the Republicans from gaining control of the court of appeals.
