Geo. Ross will leave in the near future for Denver, where he has accepted a position as foreman of a gang of bricklayers.

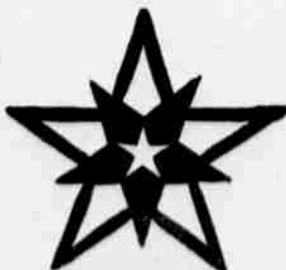
