On Sunday morning about two a.m. Chas. Moranville received a blow over the left side of the head from a club or a sandbag which came very near ending his days. He had been doctoring a sick horse at C. M. Smith's livery barn all night and had just started to make a trip to his residence to see that everything was all right at home. He went out of the rear end of the barn and had not gone more than three or four steps when he received the blow. Just how long he was unconscious after receiving the blow is not known, but when he did recover he was so weak from loss of blood that he could scarcely drag himself to his residence, one-half a block, and where he stayed alone until morning, owing to the fact that himself and wife had been stopping at the residence of her parents during the absence of her mother, Mrs. J. H. Smith. Here he was found by his wife in the morning scarcely able to move, and afraid to attempt to walk for fear of falling on the street. Medical assistance was summoned and the wound dressed. An examination disclosed that the blow extended from the top of the head down across the forehead and the end of the club or sandbag striking in the eye and fracturing the skull just above the eye. The eye is cut and also badly bruised and he will probably lose the sight of it. The deed was evidently done for the purpose of robbery, as all the money he had on his person, about \$10 in silver, was taken. Mr. Moranville is at present getting along as well as could be expected, but will no doubt be laid up for some time.
