LOCALLY

A good deal of conjecture is being indulged in as to the building operations which will take place here the coming summer and fall. Besides the two brick business houses which will be built on the corner north of the F. & M. bank building, to a man up a tree it looks like several more would be added. The little remarks which this paper has made in regard to the advocacy of building bricks have taken root and we will soon have the satisfaction of seeing them bear fruit. The fallacy of doing business in old frame buildings, which without the lot on which they are situated would not sell for more than \$150, and for which the owners receive a yearly rental of from \$300 to \$500 has become apparent. The scales have fallen from the eyes of some of the renters and they have begun to see what the real value to be gained by being in a brick building is. Among the different things is better fire protection, lower insurance, greater volume of business, comfortable and cleanly quarters, saving of fuel, etc. Take the matter of fire protection and insurance and the man who is in a frame building is up against a hard proposition. He cannot afford to insure his goods at anything like their real value and if a fire comes he is at its mercy. A man who may have thousands invested in a stock of goods may see the hard work and saving of years go up in smoke. This is no fairy tale. The business man who has been seeing a big portion of his profits going in rentals will wonder why he does not secure a lot and build for himself so that in the years to come he will have something for what he has paid out. Now is the accepted time, money is plenty and cheap and the value of lots with frame shacks low. Stand up for Red Cloud and build a brick.
