Louis Bagger & Co., patent attorneys, Washington, D. C., report that on last Tuesday Samuel Smith, a resident of this place, obtained a valuable patent for improvements in endless conveyers for grading plows and to other residents of this state seven patents were issued on the same date.  
The city council met in adjourned session on Tuesday evening and passed an ordinance for the refunding of the present outstanding six per cent water bonds. The new bonds will draw four and one-half per cent, a yearly saving to the city of about \$375.00. The new bonds will be optional after ten years. This may not look like much of a saving to some, but in the aggregate of twenty years it means a saving of \$7,500.00 to the taxpayers of Red Cloud. The refunding ordinance appears elsewhere in this issue and should be read by all. It is a good thing and should have been done long ago.  
Last week through an oversight we omitted to note the progress made in the case of the city of Red Cloud vs. Michigan Trust Co., more commonly known as the electric light bond suit. The case as it now stands is in the same condition as the first case wherein the F. & M. Bank building was involved. The case was heard in the district court, the evidence submitted and the judge has notified the attorneys to file briefs or argument, and the decision will probably be given at the June term. The general opinion of conservative people is that the city will win the suit.
