Work on the new residence of Jno. Polnick on Cedar street is progressing finely. When completed Mr. Polnick will have a very neat and spacious house.

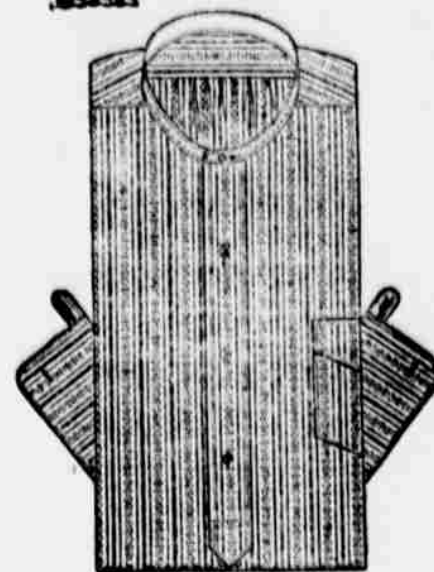
