

DEATH OF D. M. PLATT.

Former Well Known Citizen of Red Cloud Dies in Chicago.

D. M. Platt, father of Charles J. Nate and Ed Platt of this city, died Wednesday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John R. Shirey, 1. Chicago, Ill. Funeral services were held Thursday in Chicago, and interment will take place today at Clinton, Wis.

Mr. Platt was born at Clinton, Wis., 65 years ago. In 1878 Mr. Platt came to Red Cloud, and in partnership with B. M. Frees of Chicago established the first lumber yard in Webster county. Several years ago he retired from the business and was succeeded by his son, Charles J. Platt. About three years ago Mr. Platt went to Chicago for medical treatment, his hearing having failed and his general health being bad, but he received little or no relief from his ailments.

At Mr. Platt's bedside during his last hours were his brother, his daughter, Mrs. John R. Shirey, and family. Mr. Ed Platt, the youngest son, was in Chicago Monday, but owing to an apparent improvement in his father's health returned to Red Cloud, arriving home Tuesday evening.

Mr. Platt was a prominent Mason, being a member of the Knight Templars. He was very well known in Red Cloud and during his many years residence here made many friends, who will regret to learn of his death.

THE CHIEF unites with the many friends of the deceased in extending sympathy to the bereaved family.

Notice of Election. Pursuant to a resolution duly adopted, by unanimous vote, by the board of education of the school district of Red Cloud city, in the county of Webster, in the state of Nebraska (being school district No. 2 in said county), at an adjourned regular meeting of said board, held March 22, 1902.

Notice is hereby given that an election is called and will be held within and for said school district on Wednesday, the 26th day of April, 1902, at the usual polling places within said district, to wit:

In the First ward of said city, at the old Platt warehouse.

In the Second ward of said city, at the firemen's hall.

And the polls will be open from 9 o'clock a. m. to 7 o'clock p. m. of said day, at which time and place all the qualified voters of said school district may cast their ballots upon the following proposition which is submitted to them, viz:

Shall the school district of Red Cloud city, in the county of Webster, in the state of Nebraska (being school district No. 2 in said county), by and through its board of education, and the proper officers thereof, to create a fund to be controlled and expended by and under the direction of the board of education of said district, for the purpose of completing the erection and furnishing of the public school building in said district, by procuring and installing a heating plant therein, issue and negotiate the negotiable coupon bonds of said school district, to be denominated the building improvement bonds (third issue) of said district, in the amount of four thousand dollars, in the denomination of five hundred dollars each, numbered consecutively from one to eight, payable to bearer, to become due twenty years after the date thereof, but to be payable at the option of the district, at any time after the expiration of ten years after their date, and to be dated the day of their issuance, and to draw interest from date at five per cent per annum, payable annually on the 1st day of July of each year, principal and interest payable at the fiscal agency of the state of Nebraska, in New York city, said bonds to be signed for said district by the president and secretary of the board of education, and shall the said school district and the taxing authorities thereof, annually, until said bonds are paid, cause to be assessed and levied upon all the taxable property within said district, in addition to all other taxes, a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds, and also annually after the expiration of ten years from the date of said bonds, in addition to all other taxes, cause to be assessed and levied upon all the taxable property in said district, for a sinking fund, a tax in the requisite amount or proportion to pay the principal of said bonds as they become due.

The term of ballots to be used at said election in favor of said question and proposition, shall be as follows:

For School District Improvement bonds (3d issue) and tax.

And the form of the ballots to be used at said election against said question and proposition, shall be as follows:

Against School District Improvement bonds (3d issue) and tax, so arranged in conformity to the present ballot law that the qualified voters of said district may vote for or against said proposition by making a cross in the usual manner in a square opposite the statement of the manner in which they desire to vote; and should a majority of the ballots cast at such election be in favor of said question and proposition, then the board of education of said district shall be authorized to issue and negotiate said bonds in the open market to the highest bidder at not less than par value and pay the proceeds thereof to the treasurer of said district to be kept by him in a separate fund and paid out as authorized by said board on warrant for said purpose specified only.
