Board of county commissioners met in regular session; members present: Richards, Gerlach, Wilson, Overman, Chairman May absent. On motion F. H. Gerlach was elected chairman pro tem.

On motion the treasurer was instructed to correct the taxes on lot 25, blk 1, Kaley and Jackson's addition to Red Cloud from \$7.80 to \$5.56 motion made by Overman and seconded by Wilson, the road petition of R. Adamson et al. be granted. The following is the vote taken—Ayes, Overman, Wilson and Richard, nays none.

On motion the resignation of R. Armstrong as O. H. R. D. No. 49 was accepted and Joe Hubacek was appointed to fill the vacancy and bond approved.

On motion the official bond of J. U. Myers as O. H. R. D. No. 11 approved. On the road petition of John Bangert, et al., the chairman appointed the following committee: Overman, Richard and Gerlach.

On motion the board adjourned until Wednesday, October 8th, 1902, 8 o'clock a.m.

Board met pursuant to adjournment. Motion made and seconded, the treasurer be instructed to transfer \$4000 from the insane fund to the bridge fund. Motion prevails.

In the matter of the contracts of commissioners, Richard and Overman for two road graders with Austin & Riley Co., limited. It is ordered that said contracts be placed on file until the time of the maturity of said contracts will be paid on representation of proper claims by said Company for said balance due on said contracts on motion the above resolution was adopted.

On motion the three claims of Judge Edson in the Heaton, Garber and Paupis cases were rejected.

On motion the treasurer is instructed to sell lots 9 to 12, blk 20. Smith and Moore's addition to Red Cloud, for \$12.25 and cost of sale.

On motion the claim of A. A. Harvey for \$125 for damages for opening road between sections 27 and 22, 1, 9, rejected.

On motion the treasurer is instructed to refund Otto Skjerve \$2.70 erroneous assessment in school district No. 69.

Motion made and seconded the treasurer be instructed to collect ten cents each for all town lots advertised for delinquent taxes instead of ten cents for each description motion carried.

On motion board adjourned until 8 o'clock a.m., October 10, board met pursuant to adjournment.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL

AMENDMENT.

The following proposed amendment to the

constitution of the State of Nebraska, as heretofore set forth in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 4, A. D. 1902.

A joint resolution proposing to amend section one of article fifteen of the constitution of the State of Nebraska, relative to the manner of submitting and adopting amendments to the constitution of the State of Nebraska.

Be It Enacted and Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:

SECTION 1. That section one of article fifteen of the constitution of the State of Nebraska be amended to read as follows:

Section 1. Either branch of the legislature may
