Mrs. Caroline Lee died at her home in the south part of town, last Friday morning. Funeral services were held at the residence, Sunday afternoon, at one o'clock conducted by the Rev. William Hauptmann, of the Congregational church. Mrs. Lee was born in Vermont in July, 1844. When three years of age her parents moved to Ogle county, Illinois where they lived until the spring of 1856 when they moved to Quasquinton, Buchanan county, Iowa, where on March 28, 1860 she was united in marriage with Robt. Lee, who survives her. She leaves to mourn her death six children, four daughters and two sons, all but one of whom were present at her death bed. Beside her children there remains to mourn her, four brothers and one sister. Deceased was a member of the Christian church but by reason of ill health has, in the past few years been unable to attend. She was an indulgent mother and loving wife. The bereaved family have the sympathy of a large circle of friends.

Through having failed to record a mortgage the Riverton bank is now mourning a loss of about \$180 through having failed to file a mortgage on some stock. Some time in July Will Tabor, living at that time north of Inavale,

purchased a threshing outfit of the Reeves Threshing-Machine Co., giving a mortgage back to the company on the outfit and also some cattle and a team of mules. This mortgage was subject to one held by O. R. Pitney. Geo. F. Noyes of Louisville, Nebraska, representing the Reeves Co., purchased the Pitney mortgage given to the company on file with the county clerk. Monday Mr. Noyes arrived in the city for the purpose of foreclosing on the Reeves Co. mortgage and finding that the team of mules had been taken to Riverton, he with attorney Mercer went to that place to take possession. Arriving in Riverton they found that the mules had been placed in a pasture south of the river. While Mr. Noyes and Mr. Mercer were at dinner two men left Riverton on horse back going southward, observing this Mr. Noyes' suspicions were aroused and taking the constable in his buggy he also left for the same direction and on coming in sight of the pasture observed that one person was leading one of the mules, and an other was closing gates after them. The runways were soon caught up with and the mules taken possession of by the constable. The mules are now in Mr. Noyes possession and will be sold by him.

Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. Members present: Overman, Gerlach, Richard and Chairman Wm. A. May, Commissioner Wilson being absent.  
On motion the petition of W. W. Hogate et al to erect a telephone line along public highway in Webster, was granted.  
On motion, board adjourned until 8:30 Nov. 12, '02.  
Board met pursuant to adjournment. On motion, the settlement of Chris Nelson as O. H. R. D. No. 39 was approved.  
On motion board adjourned to go to Inavale to inspect roads in Inavale Twp., on the complaint of Messrs. W. J. Vance and L. C. Olmstead.  
Nov. 13, '02. Board met pursuant to adjournment, members all present.  
On motion, the settlements of Wm. M. McClure as O. H. R. D. No. 15 and E. J. Emerson as O. H. R. D. No. 24 were approved.  
The following official bonds were approved: J. E. Fox O. H. R. D. No. 12, E. J. Cox assessor Beaver Creek Twp., W. A. Shoemaker assessor Walnut Creek Twp., and E. Peters assessor Guide Rock Twp.  
The quarterly report of Judge I. W. Edson examined and approved.  
On motion, Commissioner Overman was appointed by the chair as a committee to confer with county attorney in regard to securing a National Monument for Thomas Reed.  
The bond of E. U. Overman for one thousand dollars, county attorney, was presented and approved.  
On motion, the treasurer was instructed to sell the following described real estate for 50 per cent of the back taxes: Lots 3 and 4 in block one R. R. add to Red Cloud, lots 5 and 6 in block three Guide Rock and lots 15 and 16 in block three Cowles.  
In the matter of the application of J. C. Brooks to have the sw 1/4 section 16 and se 1/4 of se 1/4 and n 1/4 of nw 1/4 section 16 all in town 3 range 13 west appraised for the purpose of sale. The following committee was appointed to appraise said land: J. G. Overman, F. H. Gerlach and W. Richard.  
The following resolution was introduced by Commissioner Richard: Resolved for convenience, we, the county board, remove the County Judge's office on or before Jan. 1, 1903, to the court house in the north west room now occupied by the Sheriff, and Sheriff McArthur is hereby instructed to procure teams and men and remove said County Judge's office furniture to place above designated. Moved by Wilson and seconded by Gerlach, the above resolution be adopted. Yeas, Wilson, Gerlach and Richard. Nays, none.
