The Election.

Tuesday's election in this county was a remarkable one, in that little or no attention was paid to party lines. "Scratching" was freely indulged in by the voters on both sides, and the estimates and calculations of party leaders went astray.

The surprise of the election was the defeat of Ed Amsek, republican nominee for sheriff, J. A. McArthur, the fusion candidate, being re-elected to the office by the narrow margin of 6 votes. The greatest change in the vote for sheriff occurred in the Second ward of this city, which two years ago gave Oliver Hedge, republican, 44 majority, and this year gave Sheriff McArthur a majority of 14, a gain of 58 votes for the fusion candidate. As the ward is ordinarily republican by an overwhelming majority, McArthur's big gain is the more remarkable.

County Clerk E. S. Garber led the republican ticket and was re-elected by the splendid majority of 400 votes. His work in the office during his first term was evidently more than satisfactory to the voters of the county.

George McCrary, the genial fusion incumbent of the county treasurer's office, will continue for another two years to smile across the counter of that office at the taxpayers of the county. His popularity is shown by the fact that he not only led his own ticket, but also had a larger majority than the leading republican candidate, 452. McCrary has a smile that won't "jar loose."

Miss Elizabeth Marker, fusion candidate for re-election to the office of county superintendent, defeated Miss Ada Skjelver by a majority of 191, a gain of 179 over her majority of two years ago.

County Judge I. W. Edson was the only candidate for re-election to suffer defeat, Albert H. Keeney, republican, winning by the splendid majority of 285 votes.

George Hutchison, fusion candidate for clerk of the district court, defeated Thomas H. Quiggle, republican, by a majority of 79. James Burden, the present incumbent of the office, is a republican.

Richard Turner, republican candidate

for county assessor, is elected over Crabb by the decisive majority of 90. Mr. Turner had an uphill fight for the office, but won handsomely.

W. R. Anderson, republican candidate for commissioner from the Second district, wins over Greig by a majority of 81.

John W. Tulleys, republican, was elected county surveyor by a good majority, and Dr. R. F. Raines, republican, is elected coroner.

Judge J. B. Barnes, republican candidate for judge of the supreme court, has a majority of about 8,000 in the state, and the republican candidates for regents of the State university are elected by about the same majority.

Judge Ed L. Adams, fusion candidate for district judge, has a majority of 82 in the county and about 150 in the district.

Henry Jones, who lives up near Blue Hill, came into town Wednesday and loaded up on fighting whisky. When he had secured enough liquid disturbance to arouse his fighting courage he started out on a hunt for trouble. Just how the scrap started no one seems to be willing to tell, but Jones began raking up an ancient feud and finally the two came to blows.
