"Behold the Man."

This subject is taken from the Bible, and was uttered by Pontius Pilate, concerning Jesus Christ, just before his crucifixion. It is, perhaps, the first expression of this kind ever made by one man in power, concerning one in absolute subjection, but it is not the first nor the last made by a multitude of people concerning one man in authority, or who is, for some reason, conspicuous.

Then Justice said: "O God, make him not, for he will trample upon thy laws." Truth made answer so and said: "O God, make him not, for he will pollute Thy sanctuaries." But Mercy, dropping upon her knees, and looking up through her tears, exclaimed: "O God, make man. I will watch over him with my care through all the dark paths he may have to tread."

Then God made man, and said unto him: "O man, thou art the child of Mercy; go deal with thy brother." History shows that Justice was right, for he has surely trampled upon the laws of God.

Then, after God had created man, He blessed him, and placed him in the Garden of Eden, and behold, every thing He had made was very good. After man has disobeyed, and was trying to hide himself from his God, and cover himself with fig leaves, the angels and archangels of heaven, who had been looking down upon the scene,

and watching the course of young Adam, cried out: "Behold the man hideth from the presence of his God already." They were astonished that Adam should act like that towards his God, but alas, how many of us act likewise!

Then later on, when Noah was building the ark, at the command of God, the multitude looked on in wonder and amazement, for they did not believe in the coming flood, and believed Noah to be a crank or crazy, and said: "Behold the man buildeth an ark, while it is yet dry;" but Noah went on, and the flood came, but not until Noah had completed the ark, and he and his family were snugly stowed away in it, and the maddened throng were driven from house and home, and compelled to fly to housetops and hilltops, and even to the mountains for safety, and as the ark floated over housetops and hilltops, again they cried out: "Behold the man who built the ark. He and his family are safe, while we who made light of him, must perish in this terrible flood."

Then again, when Moses was leading the children of Israel out of the land of Egypt into the land of Canaan, they came to the Red sea and the Egyptians thought they were cornered, and must now soon surrender, but as Moses stretched his hand and rod over the waters and they began to divide, the Egyptians cried out: "Behold the man, even the waters obey him." And the Israelites, after they had passed through, and were safely on the other side, cried out: "Behold the man who brought us hither," giving Moses the praise instead of God, to whom all praise belongs.

When Daniel was forbidden to pray, under the penalty of being cast into the lions' den, he was watched closely by the angry crowd of Babylonians, who were anxious to see the edict of the king carried into effect; and when he threw open his windows, and knelt down and prayed, in spite of the edict, they cried out: "Behold the man prayeth," and reported what they had seen to the king, and demanded that the sentence be carried into effect. Then, when he had been in the lion's den twenty-four hours, and was taken out alive and unharmed, this same throng again cried out: "Behold, the man is not harmed," and they were doomed to the same penalty meted out for him, but did not receive the same treatment in the lion's den.

Let us beware in passing judgment upon the acts of other people. Let us be sure that we are right, and they are wrong, before we inflict punishment. But this expression has been made of men, not beloved of God, as were Noah, Moses and Daniel.

When Alexander the Great had conquered the world, and wept because there were no more victories to win, all men gazed at him in wonder and said: "Behold the man weepeth because he hath conquered the world." What an example of human ambition! It is now estimated that John D. Rockefeller is worth \$500,000,000, and is still striving for more, still keeping up the example of human nature, but in another direction. He is now the wealthiest man living, or who ever has lived, and the world at large says: "Behold the man."

It was thought, before the battle of Marathon, that the small Greek army was not able to cope with the mighty Persian army, but Miltiades urged them on, saying: "It is liberty or bondage with us," and the great battle was fought, with a complete victory for the Greeks. Miltiades commanded the Greek army in person, and after the wonderful victory became known, the whole Greek army stood in awe of him, and the whole nation cried out: "Behold the man."

"The same cry went up for Caesar, Napoleon, and our own beloved Washington. When it became known that

The British army had surrendered to him at Yorktown and that the war had at last terminated in our favor, and that we were indeed a free people, we began to cast about for a man to be first president of the United States under the articles of confederation, and the whole nation, with one accord, turned to him and said: "Behold the man Washington," and he was chosen, without a dissenting voice, first president of the United States.

So it has been with the great men of all nations, and in all times. When a great crisis is over, the nation looks upon the conqueror as a hero, and in their hearts if not aloud, say: "Behold the man." But with Jesus Christ the conditions and surroundings were different. He was a prisoner, at the bar of Pilate, who had violated no law, and committed no offense, but was charged with blasphemy, which called for the death penalty by crucifixion, and an angry mob was bent on venting its anger, and in Pilate it found a weak resistance. Pilate was governor, and Jesus Christ a subject. After carefully examining all the charges brought against Him, he led Him forth and declared he found no fault in Him. "Then Jesus came forth, wearing a crown of thorns, and a purple robe, and Pilate said unto them: 'Behold the man.'"

Here Pilate had absolute authority to prevent His crucifixion, but lacked the courage to perform his duty, although he knew him to be innocent. God had otherwise decreed, and perhaps he could not.

How many men in authority today act as Pilate did!

The mob knew Pilate believed Him to be innocent, for he said: "I find no fault in Him," and when he saw that the mob was bent on His crucifixion, he simply said to them: "Behold the man."

From that day to this, all men, everywhere, whether saints or sinners, have looked to the cross, and in their hearts have said: "Behold the man Jesus, who suffered and died that we may live."

Even the professed infidel, in his heart and mind, looks to Calvary and says: "Behold the man: blessed man: savior of the world. He died for me, too." The prophecy has been fulfilled, viz: "As the serpent was lifted up in the wilderness, so shall the son of man be lifted up." As those who obeyed, and looked upon the brazen serpent, were cured of their maladies, so those who look upon the son of man, believing in Him, are cured of sin. Original sin, by His death, is wiped out, so that now we are only answerable for the sins we commit. Let us therefore be careful what we do, think or say, for "as man thinketh so is he."

When Martin Luther abandoned the Roman Catholic church (whether right or wrong) and set up a different theology, he was denounced as a heretic, and excommunicated from the church, out of the whole civilized world (church and all) said: "Behold the man."

Now that Pope Pius X has been elected and installed as the head of the great church, men of all churches, all over the world, have turned their eyes upon him, and all say: "Behold the man," and many are waiting and watching to see what change, if any he will make in church affairs. "Man proposes and God disposes" is true the world over, and will ever remain true
