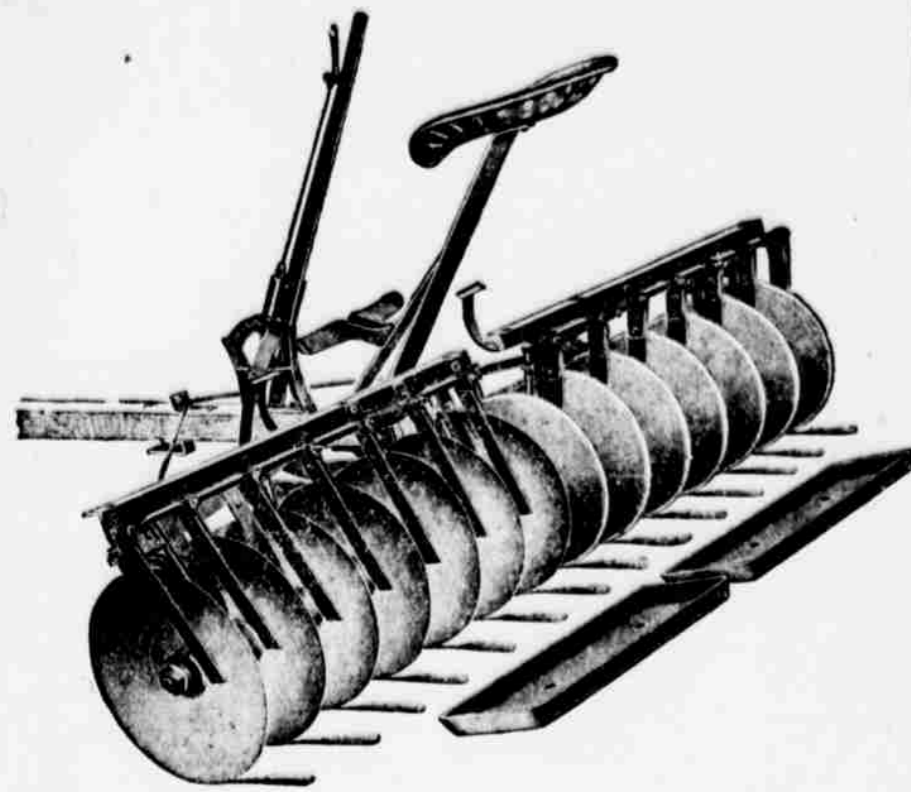

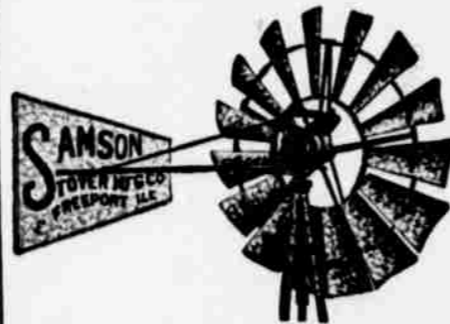

Many people seem to have gained an erroneous impression of the clause in the new revenue law relative to the assessment of farm property. The idea seems to be that buildings erected after the assessment this spring will escape taxation for four years, because the law provides for the assessment of farm lands but once in four years. The fact of the matter is that such improvements will be assessed and taxed every year, and the law provides amply for such taxation. When property is destroyed by fire or storms, provision is made that the value of such property shall be deducted from the regular assessment. Under the new law there are no loopholes through which any one can escape taxation.
