City Council.
Red Cloud, Sept. 19, 1904.

The city council met in special session pursuant to adjournment, Mayor Ross presiding. Councilmen present: Cather, Frame, Warren and Parker. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

W. K. Gear appeared before the council and claimed that the stringers under his sidewalk are in good condition and said he was not able to build a new walk; he claimed the old walk could be put in good condition by repairing it. Matter referred to Councilman Frame.

Studebaker & Finkencinder were authorized to build a cement crossing at the east intersection of Fourth avenue and Seward street at 60c per running foot, crossing to be three feet wide. They were also authorized to build a similar crossing at the west intersection of Second avenue and Seward street.

Councilman Parker introduced an ordinance regulating the protection of areaways, coal holes, etc., which, under a suspension of the rules, was unanimously adopted. The ordinance will be found elsewhere in this paper.

Kansas City Market.
Special to THE CHIEF.

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 20.—The very satisfactory market on killing cattle last week received a set back yesterday on a run of 27,000 head here and big runs at other points, of 5 to 15 cents on various kinds outside of corn fed beef cattle; those held steady, and are as high as any time this year; \$6.25 was paid Friday for best drove here, and other sales were at \$6 to \$6.25 during the last half of the week. The best price of the year was paid in June \$6.40. Quite a lot of \$5.50 to \$5.85 cattle were marketed last week, but the best price today is \$6, as nothing extra toppy is here, although the supply is 18,000 head. Grass steers are selling at \$3.50 to \$4.50, and grass cows and heifers at \$2.35 to \$3.50, for those above canners, which range downwards, but are selling better than before the settlement of the strike. Veal calves are 50 to 75 cents lower than high time,

but are selling stronger this week again, at \$4.50 to \$5.50. All classes of stock and feeding cattle are lower than a week ago. Trade is active, however, and a very good clearance of the yards was made last week. Feeders lost 10 to 25 cents in the last week, and bring \$3 to \$3.85. Stockers and stock calves lost 20 to 40 cents since a week ago and bargains are picked up occasionally at \$2 to \$2.75 for very decent stock cattle, while the pick of the yards can be had for \$3.25 to \$3.75.

The exceedingly small receipts of hogs are of much benefit to price but are disappointing to packers. The market is strong near every day, an advance of 15 to 25 cents for the two days this week, putting the top today at \$6.05, the highest point in a year and just about where hogs were selling this time last fall. Bulk of all the hogs sold above \$5.85, and the market was strongest at the close.

Sheep and lamb receipts are large, and consist almost entirely of westerns. Lambs have sold lower in the last week, 10 or 15 cents, but sheep are steady, stock and feeding kinds higher. Best lambs now bring \$5.35, native wethers \$3.40 to \$3.90, ewes \$3 to \$3.65. Westerns for feeding purposes sell at \$3.40 to \$3.70 for wethers and yearlings \$3 to \$3.25 for ewes, and choice ewes brought \$4 last week.

The open season for prairie chicken, sage chicken and grouse begins one week from tomorrow, October 1, and ends November 30.

The open season for quail begins November 1 and ends November 30.

The open season for wild ducks, teal ducks and brant began September 1 and ends April 15 next.

The season for fishing ends October 31 and opens again April 1.

Ordinance No. 46.

An ordinance regulating area ways, cellar ways, coal holes and all openings in and excavations under sidewalks in the city of Red Cloud, and providing penalties for the violation hereof.

Be it ordained, by the Mayor and Council of the City of Red Cloud:

Section 1. All area ways, cellar ways, coal holes and other openings, in or through any sidewalk in the city of Red Cloud, are hereby prohibited, except under the following conditions: No area way, cellar or basement way or opening for light shall extend more than four feet from the building line, and if used as a stairway, such opening shall be constructed of a steel doorway laid on a level with the sidewalk, protected by a substantial and well-constructed iron railing not less than three feet in height; other similar openings for light or air, not extending beyond said distance from the building line, shall be protected by a like railing, or be kept covered by a substantial, safe grating, the top of which shall be on a level with the sidewalk surface. Coal holes shall be kept covered and protected by a safe and substantial metal covering or grating, the top thereof to be on a level with the sidewalk surface.

Section 2. No permanent excavation beneath the sidewalk space shall be made for a greater distance than twelve feet beyond the building line, and in all cases of excavations beneath the sidewalk space, not occupied by a stairway protected by a railing as in this ordinance provided, the walk above shall be well constructed of suitable materials agreeable to the provisions of the ordinances on that subject and shall be kept firmly supported from beneath. The manner of protecting excavations under sidewalks is all as follows: All excavations shall be walled up with a good quality of brick, stone or cement, to the proper height, steel beams shall be used to span the opening and brick or cement used to arch between said beams, then permanent walk shall be laid on top of said work. This work must be done in a satisfactory manner to the council.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of every owner, agent or occupant of property in said city having adjacent sidewalk subject to the provisions hereof, to at once repair and construct the same to conform to the provisions hereof, and the council may, by resolution, require any such work or space to be so repaired, and all prohibited openings or ways thereon to be closed upon ten days' notice by resolution of the adjacent property, and any property owner or occupant who shall, after such notice, fail to reconstruct or repair such sidewalk as herein required shall, in addition to civic liability, for each day's failure be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction be fined any sum not exceeding fifty dollars.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment.
The following proposed amendment to and convention for the revision of the constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska to be voted on at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 8 A. D. 1904:

(SENATE FILE NO. 114.)
A Bill for a Joint Resolution recommending to the electors of the state to vote at the next election of members of the Legislature for or against a convention to revise amend and change the Constitution of the State of Nebraska in accordance with section 2, Article 15, of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.
As it Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska.

1. That it is deemed necessary to call a convention to revise amend and change the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.
2. That the electors are recommended to vote at the next election of members of the Legislature for or against a convention to revise amend and change the constitution of the State of Nebraska.
3. That at such next election of members of the Legislature on the ballot of each elector voting in such manner that the elector can indicate his preference under the law the words: "Propose calling a convention to revise amend and change the Constitution of the State of Nebraska." and "AGAINST calling a convention to revise amend and change the constitution of the State of Nebraska." and if a majority voting, at said election shall vote for a convention, the Legislature shall, at its next session, provide by law for calling the same.
I, Geo. W. Marsh, Secretary of State of the State of Nebraska, do hereby certify that said proposed amendment and revision of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska is submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Nebraska, for their adoption or rejection, at the general election to be held on Tuesday, the 8th day of November, A. D. 1904.
In testimony whereof, I hereunto set my hand and affixed the Great Seal of the State of Nebraska.
Done at Lincoln this 6th day of July in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Four, and of the Independence of the United States the One Hundred and Twenty-Sixth, and of this State the Thirty-Eighth.
