Red Cloud water refunding bonds, amounting to \$22,000, were sold on the 12th to N. W. Harris & Co., of Chicago, III. The bonds are to draw 41/2 per cent interest and will result in a saving of about \$330 a year to the city. The bonds may be taken up by the city after ten years.
