CAMPBELL IN THE TOILS.

Well-Known Former Grain Buyer Charged With Embezzlement.

C. R. Campbell, who for several years was the local agent for the Ferguson Elevator Company, was arrested at Haigler, Neb., Sunday by Sheriff McArthur and brought back to Red Cloud for trial upon the charge of having embezzled a large amount of the company's funds. It is said Campbell's peculations will amount to \$4,884.80.

Campbell was taken before Judge Keeney Monday, but his preliminary hearing was postponed until Thursday.

After a preliminary hearing lasting all day yesterday and this forenoon Campbell was held to the district court in the sum of \$1000.

Charley Campbell's downfall is directly traceable to the gambling houses which have been in operation in this city for so long a period, and more particularly to the "bucket shop" which was operated openly in the Royal Hotel building. Campbell was working on a small salary, but had the tastes of a millionaire, in and order to gratify his taste for booze and his passion for gambling he used his employers' money to speculate on the board of trade in the hope of winning a fortune.

But fortune refused to smile upon him, and his losses caused him to resort to heavy drinking and neglect of business, which finally resulted in his discharge from the services of the elevator company last fall. In the meantime he had become entangled with a well-known woman of the town, and in company with her he went to Haigler, where they took adjoining claims and lived together, passing themselves off as brother and sister. It is said that people of the neighborhood became aware of their true relations and that the women administered a flogging to "Rose" and warned her to leave. It is also said that Campbell had made threats that if anyone attempted to arrest him he would kill that person. At the time of his arrest Campbell had in his home a Winchester rifle and other firearms, but he offered no resistance when Sheriff McArthur served the papers.

Charley Campbell had many friends here and was well liked by all who were personally acquainted with him, but his liking for strong drink combined with a passion for gambling and the wiles of an unscrupulous harlot were his undoing.

There had been rumors for a long time that he was short in his accounts, but no one suspected that his shortages would reach such a large figure. He was under bond to the elevator company, but one of the provisions of the bond, which was furnished by a guaranty company, was that the company should check up his accounts at least once each year. This the company failed to do and as a consequence the elevator company's loss is complete.

stockers and feeders held unchanged, while common kinds dropped 10 to 15 cents. Receipts of cattle Monday were 7256. Beef steers were scarce and the market strong to 10 cents higher. Cows and heifers were steady to strong, except country grades, which were weak to 10 cents lower. Stockers and feeders slow, best kinds selling steady and others weak to lower. Receipts today were 7800. The proportion of beef steers was liberal. The inquiry for them was good, however, and trading was active at strong rates. Top was \$6.15, which is the highest this year. Cows and heifers were steady to strong. Top heifers bought \$5.20, which is the highest of the season. Bulls were firm. Stockers and feeders were active and unchanged.

The week's market closed Saturday a shade higher than the week before and 10 to 15 cents higher than the corresponding period a year ago. Receipts Monday were 6146 and the market fully 5 cents lower. Receipts today were 10,000 and the market strong to 5 cents higher. Bulk of sales were from \$5.15 to 5.32 1/2; top \$5.37 1/2.

The sheep and lamb market closed the week on Saturday with values 10 to 20 cents lower on everything. Receipts Monday were 3145, the greater part of this number being lambs. The demand was good and in spite of depressing reports from outside markets, trading was active and prices steady. Receipts today were 7400. Trading was rather slow but sheep remained steady; lambs steady to 10 cents lower. We quote: Choice lambs, \$7.25 to 7.35; choice yearlings, \$6.50 to 6.60; choice wethers, \$5.75 to 6.00; choice ewes, \$5.50 to 5.60.

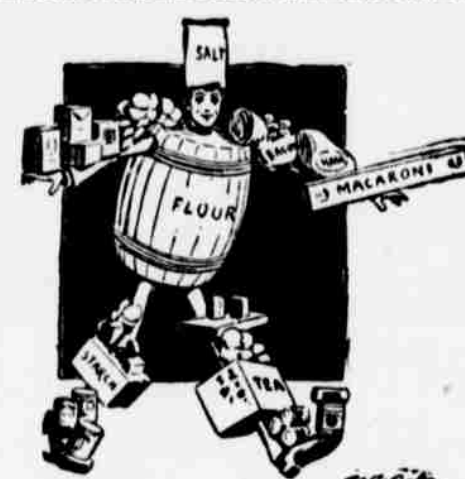
