Billie Evans was the victim, and it is supposed he had mixed with some one over the game and met his death by a blow on the side of the head and thrown down stairs. The parties to the crime made themselves scarce. A coroner's inquest was held yesterday and today but at the time of going to press we are not able to learn if a verdict has been reached. The report that a man had confessed to the killing is said to be a mistake by those who came from Nelson this morning. The victim had been dead only a short time when found, as his body was limp and warm—Superior Express.
