KANSAS CITY, Oct 3—Receipts of cattle Monday were 21,000, the percentage

of choice cornfed beef steers small and the market steady to strong for them. All other classes of cattle were practically steady. Receipts today were 25,000. Cornfed native steers were strong and active; grassers about steady. Cows ruled steady to 10 cents lower. Veals and bulls held unchanged. Best stockers and feeders were scarce and firm; others slow and weak.

Receipts of sheep Monday were 7000 and the market steady to strong. Today's run was 4000 and again strong figures ruled. We quote—choice lambs, \$6 75 to 7 00; choice yearlings, \$4 75 to 5 00; choice wethers, \$4 66 to 4 85; choice ewes, \$4 25 to 4 50.
