A PARTIAL VICTORY.

Judge Keeney and J. J. Garber are Defeated.

In the election last Tuesday the Republicans gained but a partial victory. John J. Garber, candidate for county clerk, was defeated by Lee DeTour of Guide Rock, by the narrow margin of 21 votes.

Judge Albert H. Keeney, upon whom a bitter fight was made by workers both inside and outside the party, was defeated by ex-Judge Edson by a majority of 100.

The balance of the Republican ticket was elected by good, safe majorities. Mrs. Caster, upon whom a hard fight was made by the opposition, leads the ticket with a majority of 305. Elsewhere will be found a table showing the official vote by precincts.

The result of the election shows that there was some trading, the defeated candidates being the sufferers. In Red Cloud, which usually gives good Republican majorities, the prin-

cipal candidates received very weak support, while Potsdam, which ordinarily is Populist, gave all the Republican candidates good majorities. It would be useless to attempt to assign a cause for the defeat of Garber and Keeney, except that there were too many candidates from the south part of the county.

However, the Republicans have gained three county officers. Five Populist officers retire—Treasurer McCrary, Sheriff McArthur, Superintendent Marker, Commissioners Gerlach and Fogel, and their places are taken by Republicans. Two new Populist officers enter the county cabinet—Lee DeTour for clerk and I. W. Edson for judge.

A County Road Overseer.

Now that the election is over, let us turn our attention to the question of getting better roads. Some time ago we suggested that the business men make it a point to get together and drive in a body over the roads leading to Red Cloud, taking with them someone who is competent to point out the best methods of placing the roads in passable condition and capable of making estimates on the cost. Then let the merchants raise a fund to pay for having the work done under competent supervision. We still believe the scheme to be a good one, and, as it is certain that something will have to be done or Red Cloud will gradually lose its prestige as a trading point, and as it is not at all certain that the county commissioners will help us out why not tackle the matter at once?

There will never be permanent good roads until the legislature passes a law providing for a county road overseer, whose duty it shall be to see that road work is done properly. The county assessor law has proved to be a godsend to taxpayers, and there is good reason to believe that a law providing for a county road overseer would show a similar result.

Let's push it along.
