## NEWS OF NEBRASKA.

### All Ready for Crowe Trial.

Omaha, Dec. 4.—All is ready for the opening of the trial of Pat Crowe today. The charge on which Crowe will be tried is the shooting of Officer A. H. Jackson with intent to kill.

### Mrs. John T. Yates Is Dead.

Omaha, Dec. 5.—Mrs. John T. Yates, wife of the sovereign clerk of the Woodmen of the World, died at St. Joseph's hospital, where she underwent a serious operation last Saturday.

### Hammond Plant Will Start Up.

South Omaha, Dec. 5.—The National Packing company of Chicago has secured possession of the old Hammond packing plant here and the work of preparing it for occupancy is to commence immediately.

### Swears Crowe Fired First Shot.

Omaha, Dec. 6.—The feature of the trial of the Pat Crowe shooting case was the testimony of Officer Jackson, the complaining witness, who positively identified Crowe as the man who shot him on the night of Sept. 6, and stated emphatically that Crowe had been the first to pull a revolver and the first to shoot.

### Thirty Japs in Car Which Burns.

Kearney, Neb., Dec. 4.—About thirty Japanese railroad laborers narrowly escaped cremation at Amherst. All escaped without serious injury, however, except three, one of whom was badly burned and taken to the hospital at Grand Island. The fire is supposed to have started from the heating stove in the car.

### Lambert Arrested Again.

Omaha, Dec. 2.—Frank Lambert, who was brought back from Portland, Ore., on complaint of subornation of perjury in the U. B. I. cattle ranch case, has been arrested on a new charge. This is of conspiracy in connection with operations of Ware & Welsh, also accused of irregularities in obtaining homestead lands for the ranch.

### Nebraska Officials at Work.

Lincoln, Dec. 1.—State officials are at work on their annual reports, which must be submitted to the governor soon after Dec. 1. The reports show an appreciable balance unexpended in all the appropriations for running expenses of the several state departments. It is anticipated that deficiency claims next year will be comparatively low.

### Blackmore Appeals Case.

Sioux City, Dec. 5.—Bishop McDowell of Chicago arrived here and today will convene the highest court of the Methodist Episcopal church for the purpose of hearing the appeal of the Rev. F. D. Blackmore of Tecumseh, Neb., who recently was tried and convicted by his conference of falsifying and immoral conduct. A jury of six men will be drawn from the Methodist pastors of the Sioux City district to try the case.

### Corn Banquet at Lincoln.

Lincoln, Dec. 4.—Contestants from all the counties in the state will come to Lincoln to attend the corn banquet at the Lincoln hotel, Dec. 15. The visitors will come on Dec. 13, and an elaborate program will precede the banquet. Many prizes will be awarded. The contestants have planted corn from seed furnished by the state educational department. State associations will be formed for both the girls and boys. The contestants number 498 and are from sixty-three counties.

### No Crime to Roll a Cigarette.

Omaha, Dec. 6.—Cigarette smokers may roll their cigarettes in Omaha undisturbed, at least until the question is decided by the supreme court. Judge Kennedy released on habeas corpus Edward Stout, who had been arrested for rolling a cigarette, that a test case might be made. The court held that the individual rolling of a cigarette is not manufacturing one within the meaning of the anti-cigarette law. The case will be carried to the supreme court to have the point definitely settled.

### Unearth Big Land Frauds.

Omaha, Dec. 1.—"Government special agents in Nebraska," declared District Attorney Baxter, "have unearthed a mass of evidence of the most startling character in relation to fraudulent appropriations of public land by perjury and subornation of perjury. The government is determined to let no guilty man escape, and there will be a rattling of dry bones when the facts already discovered are brought before the grand jury. Many thousands of acres will be thrown open again for homesteaders when the investigations are completed."

### Huntington Ready to Quit.

Lincoln, Dec. 4.—Chancellor D. W. C. Huntington of the Wesleyan university at University Place has tendered his resignation to the board of trustees, to take effect in June next

year. The reason assigned for the action is the advanced age of the educator, who finds it difficult to attend to the field work of the institution. The resignation had been in the possession of Governor Mickey, who is a member of the board of trustees, since September, but he has just disclosed the matter to his colleagues. A committee of seven, of which the governor is chairman, has been appointed to act on the resignation and look for a new chancellor if it is accepted.
