No More Water for Burlington.

At the meeting at the city council Monday night the city clerk was instructed to give the Burlington Railway Co. the required thirty days' notice that the city would no longer supply the company with water. This action has been taken owing to the numerous complaints of the tax payers that they were unable to get a sufficient supply of water. It will cause a great reduction in the revenue derived from the water plant, but it is hoped to offset this reduction by making a flat rate to private consumers which will increase the revenue sufficiently to equal the loss sustained by cutting off the Burlington.
