"Swastika."

The word "Swastika" is derived from the Sanscrit, meaning good fortune, well being, welfare. It is the oldest known symbol in the world, and is found in prehistoric graves and ruins in all quarters of the globe. It is carved upon the solid rock in the mountains of India, and painted upon the walls of the canons in Arizona. It is dug up out of the ruins of the ancient Greece, and from the graves of the


Mound Builder Indians in Ohio. It is found on Cliff Dwellers' pottery in North America, and upon prehistoric pottery in Brazil. It is common in China and Japan. It appears on the forehead of gods in the temples, and on the walls of the rock cut and carved temples of the Buddhas, and also on Brahmin monuments. It is placed on the breast of the dead in Tibet, and ornaments the petticoats of the women in that country. It has been found in Berkshire, England, and in Peru. It is shown in the ruins of Algeria and on the bronze ingots of aborigines in Ashantee. Many specimens have been obtained from the Indian Burial Mounds of the Mississippi Valley, and Mounds of Tennessee and Georgia.

At the present time some of the American Indians use the Swastika as a sacred symbol, as well as in ornament or ceremony; among them are the Kansas or Sac Indians, and particularly the Navajos, Pimas and Pueblos. The Navajos weave it into their blankets and manufacture it in silver.

Thomas Wilson, Curator of the U. S. National Museum, in his book "The Swastika" says of it:

"What seems to have been at all times as an attribute of the Swastika, is its character as a charm or amulet, as a sign of benediction, blessing, long life, good fortune, good luck. This character has continued into modern times, and while the Swastika is recognized as a holy and sacred symbol, by at least one Buddhist religious sect, it is still used by the common people of India, China and Japan as a sign of long life, good wishes and good fortune.

"Thus was shown that in far as well as near countries, in modern as well as ancient times, this sign stood for blessing, good wishes, and by a slight extension, for good luck."
