The Orthopedic Hospital.

The Nebraska house has passed a bill appropriating \$30,000 for a building and \$27,000 for maintenance of the Orthopedic hospital at Lincoln. This is one of the most deserving institutions in the state. In the Orthopedic hospital the maimed, crippled and deformed children of residents of the state receive free medical and surgical treatment. A year ago the editor paid a visit to this hospital and was greatly impressed with the good work that was being done. Among the patients at that time were two little children who had been so "bow-legged" they could hardly stand, but the doctors had straightened their limbs to the normal position. Other children had "club-foot" straightened, and still others were being treated for all kinds of afflictions. The children all seem happy at the prospect of being restored to the form which nature intended they should bear.

Silver Wedding.

Charles G. Peterson and Annie Sandberg were married in Des Moines, Iowa, March 9, 1882, and came to Webster immediately afterward to make their home. Last Saturday was the 25th anniversary of their wedding, and a large crowd of their relatives and friends were invited to their home, seven miles southeast of Red Cloud, to partake of a sumptuous dinner in honor of the day. Many of those invited were kept away by the severe storm, but those who attended enjoyed a grand time. School Notes

The walls of the assembly room have been bordered with green burlap, held in place by strips of moulding, above and below.

There seems to be little doubt that the bonds will carry. The next thing, then, is to get ready to build a good, substantial building—one that can be thoroughly ventilated and equally heated and lighted.

There is another law before the legislature—one that was strongly endorsed by the State Teachers' Association and for which the state superintendent is working hard: The law providing \$700 annually for fifty high schools that shall qualify for the normal high school course. Red Cloud can qualify by adding a fourth high school teacher and purchasing some \$100 worth of books on pedagogy. This law is quite likely to pass. If it does Red Cloud is sure to take advantage of its terms.

While no definite action has been taken, it is practically certain that the North ward building will be used for the high school in case the bonds carry and the new building for the grades. The high school law, offering free tuition to rural pupils, has passed both houses and has been signed by the governor. This measure will surely greatly increase the high school enrollment. The revenue from this source will doubtless be sufficient to pay for the services of a fourth teacher in the high school. The assembly room is too small for our present enrollment. However, the partition can easily be removed between that room and the office, this affording about 350 additional square feet. In fact, the entire North ward building is none too large for the enrollment that the high school can secure if we make the effort. Above all things, we should have at least two courses. We should not insist on all pupils taking the full Latin course. We should have more history, science, english and mathematics that may be chosen instead of the Latin. There is little doubt that next year will mark a great change in the high school, as well as in the grades.
