

word of which was received here: The police received word from Rosemont. Neb., this morning that John Coon, of that place, committed suicide last night by hanging himself. Two of his daughters live in Lincoln and the police were requested to notify them of the occurrence. The message was received at 9:50 and five minutes later both of the daughters had been found, Miss Dolly Coon, a waitress at the Palace Dining hall, and Miss Elsie Coon, an employe of the Globe Laundry company. Both girls left this morning for Rosemont. The police received no particulars in regard to the alleged suicide and the daughters volunteered no information.
