Mrs. Bivens.

Mrs. Bivens, aged about 70, died at her home near Guide Rock Tuesday noon and was buried Wednesday afternoon.

Lulu Frances Smith.

Lulu Frances Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Smith of Garfield township, died last Saturday and was buried Sunday. Funeral services were held at the Brethren church on Ash creek, conducted by Rev. Noah Waggoner. Interment was in the Martin cemetery. Miss Smith had been ill for several months and a short time ago underwent a course of treatment at a sanitarium in Lincoln, but failed to get relief.

Viola Emery Maurer

Viola Emery was born at Perotonia, Ill., July 15, 1844. She attended Mt. Morris seminary and later taught school in Lincoln, Ill., at which place she married Henry J. Maurer in 1871. One year later Mr. Maurer came to Red Cloud to establish their home, she, however, remaining in Lincoln, Ill., one year longer. She united with the Presbyterian church before coming here. To the union were born three children—Fred, Clarence and Nellie, all of whom survive her to mourn with their father the loss of wife and mother. She had reached the age of 64 years 7 months and 15 days.

Mrs. Chris Zeiss.

Mrs. Chris Zeiss died Wednesday morning at her home in the south part of town, from consumption, after an illness of nearly two years. Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at 2:30 at the Congregational church. Roxaline Wilson was born in Iowa, August 31, 1866. February 22, 1887, she was married to Chris Zeiss, in Cowles, Neb. To this union five children were born, all of whom are living—Vernon, Garry, Violet, Edith and Berdon. She is also survived by her husband, father, four sisters and four brothers.

Matilda Fuller

Matilda Kipp was born in Ranssauer county, New York, in 1819. She was married to Jacob Fuller in 1840. To this union were born six boys, seven girls, of whom five boys and one girl are yet living. In 1845 they moved to Jones county, Iowa, where Mr. Fuller died in 1860. In 1879 she moved to Webster county, Nebraska, and died at Cowles, Neb., Feb. 28, 1908, having reached the age of 89 years. She joined the Methodist church in early girlhood, but after coming to Nebraska she united with the Christian church at Cowles. The funeral took place from the last named church Saturday, February 29, Rev. Martin, the Christian church minister at Guide Rock, assisted by Rev. Sam Deacon conducting the last sad rites. Interment was made in Cowles cemetery.

Edwin Mohler.

Edwin Mohler, one of the best known farmers on the south side of the river, died Monday morning at his home on the old Waggoner homestead, in Garfield township. Funeral services were held Tuesday and interment was in the Waggoner cemetery.

Edwin Mohler was born in North Manchester, Ind., October 26, 1849. He joined the Brethren church in 1877. He came to this county in the fall of 1879, and on January 11, 1880, he was united in marriage to Sarah Waggoner. To this union were born five children, one of whom died in infancy. Besides his wife he is survived by two daughters and two sons—Mary, Edith, Edwin and Robert. The funeral was one of the largest ever held in that part of county.

Eliza Jane Hidy.

Miss Eliza Jane Powers was born March 10, 1835, in the state of Indiana, moved with her parents to Iowa in 1837, where she was united in marriage to Joseph Hidy in 1858, and died at their home in Webster county, Nebraska, March 3rd, 1908, being 72 years 11 months and 24 days of age at the time of her death. Mr. and Mrs. Hidy moved to Webster county in 1878 on the homestead where they were living

at the time of her death. To this union six children were born, three of whom with the aged husband still remain to mourn the loss of a loving wife and mother. Rev. Martin of Guide Rock conducted the funeral services which were held at the house. She was a member of the Christian church. Mr. Hidy will make his home in the future with his son Will near Trenton, Neb.
