**Republican City Convention.**

The delegates to the republican city convention met in Firemen's hall Thursday afternoon. They could not meet in the court house as that was in use by the county board. The delegates chosen at the caucuses last Monday night were as follows: A. U. Kaley, Geo. Morhart, James Burden, Chas. Robinson, Rev. A. A. Cressman, Geo. Baylor, D. W. Turnure, Ed McAllister, Ed J. Overing, Jno. Vost, Dr. O. A. Nelson, F. W. Studebaker, Wm. Frahm, Paul Storey, C. F. Cather, Ira Wolf and Chas. Reigle for the north ward and J. F. Edwards, Chas. H. Kaley, Fred Mandeville, Jno. Crans, M. Able, Wm. Bohrer, Ed Amaek, W. N. Richardson, Wm. Koon, Chas. Kessler and Jno. Galbraith for the south ward.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. L. P. Albright and Chas. Robinson was chosen as permanent chairman and Mr. J. F. Edwards was selected as secretary. The convention then proceeded to the nomination of candidates by informal ballot. The following men were nominated: J. O. Caldwell, mayor; Jas. Burden, clerk; J. O. Butler, treasurer; Clarence Reed, police judge; George Overing, city engineer. Ed Amaek was nominated to fill the vacancy in the First ward and Ed Pulsifer was nominated for the full term. C. D. Robinson was nominated for councilman in the Second ward.

The convention then adjourned as a city convention and reconvened in mass convention for the purpose of nominating two men for the school board. Frank Studebaker and Henry Newhouse received the majority of the votes on the formal ballot and were declared the nominees of the convention, the vote standing 42 each for, as against 31 each for the next two highest. The convention then adjourned.
