Menzo Warren Terry of Beatrice, who has been visiting here with relatives and attending the chautauqua, returned to his home on Monday.

He was elected to the office of county attorney of Gage county two years ago, notwithstanding the fact that his county has long been one of the banner republican counties of the state. Mead Shumway, who was convicted of murdering Mrs. Sarah Martin on the 3rd of last September, and the supreme court has recently affirmed the decision of the lower court and set Friday, October 30, as the day of execution.
